# Baker Announces Plans To Run Again For House

Raymond L. Baker (R-Farmington) announced today he is a candidate for re-election to the State House of Representatives.

Baker is completing his fifth two-year term representing the 6th District, which includes West Bloomfield and Farmington townships and the cities of Farmington, Latrup Village, Keego Harbor and that part of Southfield west of Lahser and north of 12 Mile.

A LEADING proponent of conservation interests, Baker is ranking minority member of the House Conservation and Recreation Committee. He was chairman of this committee in 1967-68 when the GOP controlled the House.

He also holds membership on the Liquor Control and Insurance committees and the Legislative Council which is composed of House and Senate Leaders.

Baker, of 32718 Grand River, Farmington, says one of his most satisfying accomplishments is enactment of the Clean Water and Quality Recreation bonding programs.

The anti-pollution and recreation expansion programs were conceived and approved by the Legislature and Michigan voters in 1968. They were implemented, through separate legislation, during the current session.

ONE OF HIS current efforts towards environmental quality is a special committee on Great Lakes water supply. He heads a subcommittee concerned with chemical pollution, such as mercury contamination in Lake Michigan.

Baker promises to "seek

responsible and effective solutions to the multitude of threats to our environment and the quality of life.

"I believe we have made significant progress. However, I recognize that there is no easy 'ultimate' answer to these problems. New crises continue to develop and meeting these situations demands ongoing attention.

"In addition to conservation," he continued, "I have also been deeply involved in attempts to resolve drug problems during my decade in the Legislature.

"This special interest stems from my background in pharmacy. The recent upsurge in drug abuse and dependency makes this a more crucial area of concern than ever."

**BAKER SERVES** on the board of directors of the National Society of State Legislators. Before being elected to the House, Baker served two terms on the Berjley city council.

He is a registered pharmacist who retired to devote full time to the Legislature. He received his education at Detroit Institute of Technology and Wayne State University.

Honors Baker has received include: Michigan Conservationist-Legislator of the Year, 1968; Michigan Pharmacist of the Year, 1968; Bowl of Hygieia Award; and Merit Award for contribution to pharmacy from the alumni association of Wayne State College of Pharmacy, 1966.
