

## To the Voters of Oakland County

It has taken nearly four years of work to plan the trunk line drainage for the southern part of the County in order to give any uniform system of Drainage for Royal Oak, Pleasant Ridge, Ferndale, Clawson, Berkley, and adjacent territory thereto, including some of Southfield township, southeast part of Bloomfield and the southern part of Troy.

A plan has been worked out whereby it is giving that territory complete drainage.

Then there is the southern part of Southfield and Farmington Townships which is being worked out at the present time. All with the idea of taking care of the sewerage as well as the drainage.

We have what is known as the Campbell Road Drain taking care of everything east of Woodward Avenue and west of the John R. District together with the outlet through the Red Run at the cost of nearly \$1,000,000 which is one of the units in the south end of the County.

Then we have the Allen & Hubbard Drains on the west of Woodward with the tax district yearly made out and some of the right of way secured which takes care of the west side of Woodward as far over as the eastern part of Southfield Township.

Then there is the Lawson Drain starting in at the junction of the 12-Mile Road and Campbell Road of the Red Run running north and westerly taking care of Clawson and all property to the east of Birmingham. One part has been let and work has already been started.

In the Farmington District we have the Clarenceville drain entering into the Rouge in Wayne County, and the Hazel drain which takes care of the southeast part of Farmington and southwest part of Southfield which contracts have been let.

At Farmington we have another large drain taking care of property west of Farmington Village which we are working on at the present time.

We have the Pontiac Creek starting in the city of Pontiac running north and westerly through the city of Pontiac, Pontiac and Waterford Township, taking in property for drainage nearly to Watkins Lake.

The Right of Way is being secured for the Patterson & Holly Drain and for the Billy Sunday running south and east of Holly and into the Patterson & Holly Drain.

With about forty other smaller drains which are being worked up at the present time.

I submit to the taxpayers of the county that with all this work successfully under way it is good business to retain the present commissioner.

### THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

"The Ten Commandments," Cecil B. De Mille's gorgeous dramatic spectacle, will open on Monday evening Sept. 8, at the New Detroit Opera House. After the opening night two showings will be given daily at 2:20 and 8:20 with all musical accompaniment by a traveling orchestra of 20 pieces. Prices for the matinee will be 50 cents to \$1.00 and nights 50¢ to \$1.50, plus war tax, and mail orders will be filled in the order of their receipt. The splendid film is presented by Adolph Zukor and Jess L. Lasky, in regular theatres only, and it will not be shown in any other theatre in the vicinity of Detroit during the current season.

Although "The Ten Commandments" was shown for the first time only last season its fame has spread throughout the country and it is well established as the greatest triumph so far attained in the art of photodrama. The scenes of historical introduction, many of them in color, showing the flight of the Children of Israel from Egypt, their safe passage through the divided waters of the Red Sea, and the pursuit by and destruction of Pharaoh's charioteers, surpass in splendor any similar scenes heretofore produced. The modern story, written by Jeanie MacPherson, is a startling and an absorbing melodramatic presentation of American life at the present time, in which it is revealed the inevitable doom of those who set aside the ancient laws in their pursuit of wealth and pleasure. The pictorial episodes in the modern narrative—such as the falling of the dome of a great cathedral and the wreck of a motor boat in a storm at sea—are no less thrilling than the miraculous scenes in the Biblical part of the picture. The love story that is woven through these episodes of high excitement is infinitely appealing and there is much fine sentiment and delightful humor in the pictured tale.

The chief roles in "The Ten Commandments" are played by Theodore Roberts, Rod La Rocque, Richard Dix, James Neill, Robert Edson, Charles De Roche, Lawson Butts, Leatrice Joy, Nita Naldi, Estelle Taylor, Edythe Chapman, Julia Faye, Clarence Burton, and Agnes Ayres. The musical score was arranged by Dr. Hugo Riesenfeld.

## JUDGE TUTTLE IS MICHIGAN PRODUCT

NINE GENERATIONS HAVE OWNED  
AND OPERATED FARMS  
IN THIS COUNTRY

HOLDS RECORD ON BENCH;  
3 REVERSES IN 12 YEARS

In the year that Michigan became a state in the Union, 1837, the grand parents of Judge Arthur J. Tuttle entered a tract of land in Ingham county. There he was born in 1858 and the very same farm is still in the Tuttle family, being operated under the direct management of the Judge, who gives it as much attention as his official position will allow. Being the ninth generation of Tuttle

farmers in this country, Judge Tuttle is not what is commonly known as a "city agriculturist." He's a plain dirt farmer, not only helping with the work, but takes the produce to market. In Detroit, on the Eastern Market, Judge Tuttle can be seen every fall selling apples, fruit from his own orchard, the trees having been brought from New York state in wagons decades and decades ago.

Judge Arthur J. Tuttle, after graduating from the Leslie high school, entered the University of Michigan, where he graduated from the literary department in 1882 and received his law degree in '85, after which he took up the practice of law in Lansing. In 1889 he was elected prosecuting attorney of Ingham county and made a state wide record in handling the Spanish-American war scandal that developed under Governor Pingree. In 1907 he was elected State Senator and in that position fathered some very progressive legislation, particularly bills of interest to workmen and farmers. In 1911 he was named U. S. District Attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan, a position that he held until named to the Federal bench for the same district twelve years ago. On the bench he has a record equalled by very few of the judiciary in the entire country. Of all the hundreds of criminal cases tried by Judge Tuttle he has been reversed only three times by a higher court.

### A Regular Republican.

Judge Arthur J. Tuttle is a life-long rock-ribbed Republican. His father was one of that faithful band that assembled under the Old flag at Jackson in 1834 and organized the Republican party. He was chairman of the Ingham county party committee four years and absolutely understands the necessity of party loyalty, such as is needed by President Coolidge at Washington at the present time.


Several months ago the friends of Judge Tuttle in various parts of Michigan, particularly leaders of the Republican party, began to urge him to become a candidate for the United States Senate, taking the stand that he was the one man that could not only be nominated, but elected at the polls in November. However, it was not until July that Judge Tuttle consented to allow his name to be used. Now his name is on the ballot for both the long and short terms at the primary.

Taking the first vacation from the bench he has enjoyed in five years and the third since appointed in 1912, Judge Tuttle for the past month has visited all of the counties in the western part of the state and the Upper Peninsula. He has not felt it necessary to talk much party politics. The principles of the Republican party are his platform. If sent to Washington to represent the State of Michigan in the United States Senate, he will stand solidly behind President Coolidge in his administration program.

### A Real American

The record of Judge Tuttle in the State Senate shows his absolute friendliness to labor, organized and unorganized, his life-long affiliation with the farming industry makes it certain that he will be right on proper legislation so far as agriculture is concerned.

Judge Tuttle's wife died more than a decade ago, since which time he has reared two daughters, both now being students at the University of Michigan. During these years he was both father and mother to them; today he remains their "pal." Just a real American, of the type that made this country what it is today and as much he has become a candidate for the United States Senate.




