DEATH OF

SHERMAN STAMANN
The bell of the Evangelical Church was tolling Tuesday, November 25 for the funeral of Mr. Herman Stamann, a well known farmer on the Seven Mile road. Only 49 years old, Mr. Stamann has suffered with cancer for twelve weeks and passed away Friday, November 21.

Born December 31, 1874 in Mecklenburg, Germany, he came with his parents to this country in 1887 and had lived since in the neighborhood of Farmington.

Besides the widow, Anna, nee Damm, he leaves three children: Walter, Alvine, and Fedra. The deceased was a brother of Augusta, Mrs. Henry Pagel, Sophie, Mrs. Charles Westfall, Fred Stamann, John Stamann, Marie, Mrs. Herman J. Schroeder and Ida, Mrs. Charles Beier.

After the church services the remains were interred at the mausoleum at Northville.

Mr. Carl Gow, one of the old settlers in Farmington Township and a charter member of the Evangelical Church, has passed away. Mr. Gow was born October 31, 1847 in Mecklenburg, Germany and came with his wife and two children to this country in 1873, making his home in the vicinity of Farmington. 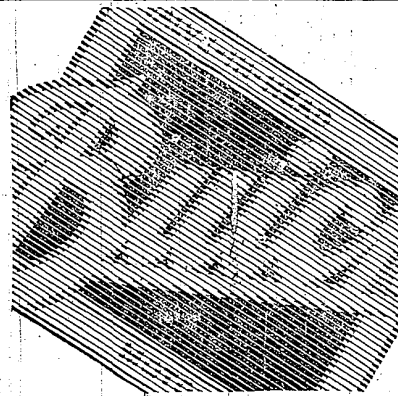
