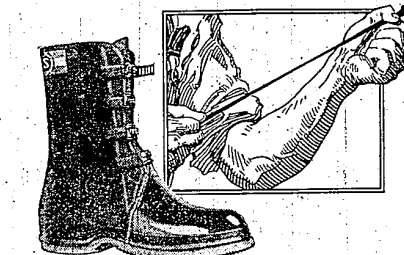

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STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Port Huron—The state public utilities commission has ordered that the 24th street viaduct be completed by Jan. 1, 1925. The viaduct will eliminate a dangerous railroad crossing. The street will then become part of a trunk line system.

Bessemer—The body of Clarence Hope, 22 years old, Ashland workman who was drowned in an open boat, 20 feet deep, has been recovered. Marks about the edge of the cliff indicated he had made a desperate struggle to save himself.

Uwosco—Fire destroyed the Isdel Bean Co.'s elevator here with a loss estimated by L. C. Sly, manager, at \$75,000. An adjoining building, used for storage purposes, was slightly damaged. During the fire a Consumers' Power Co. line broke and the city was in darkness for two hours.

Holland—In the recent of Ottawa county herds in which reactors were found during the first test for tuberculosis, cattle, but three and one-half per cent of cattle were found to react. In the first test last year there was an average of 8.23 per cent in the county among all the herds tested.

Mt. Clemens—The Detroit United railway has filed a motion for a new trial in the Wiggle case. A jury in the circuit court recently awarded \$7,000 damages to Mrs. John Wiggle, of Halfway, for the death of her husband who was killed about a year ago in a smashup between a Rapid Railway car and a bus.

Marshall—School children of Marshall are to have more room in which to play, but two residents of this city are to lose their residences to make this possible. A special jury in Circuit Court has decided that the residence properties adjoining the present school grounds, should be condemned, so that the playground might be enlarged.

Lansing—Detroit residence telephone rates are reduced \$3.50 a year, effective February 1, by an order issued by the Michigan Public Utilities commission. No change is made in the business phone rates. Under the new order, the rate on one-party residence phone is reduced from \$5 to \$4.70 a month, two-party \$4 to \$3.70, four-party \$3 to \$2.70.

Pontiac—Announcement has been made by City Master C. W. Ham of a program of street widening and extensions running to \$800,000. The entire city is to be made into a special assessment district upon which this amount will be spread. It will be collected in 10 equal installments, but the city will sell bonds so the money will be available this year.

Mt. Clemens—Five townships in Macomb county are now served by the Mt. Clemens Gas Light Co., as a result of the election in Erie Township granting the company permission to operate there. At a special election to be held in Mt. Clemens, Feb. 16, the company will submit its petition for a new franchise to replace the one which expires in 1923.

Tecumseh—Frank Snell, 35 years old, a native of Tecumseh and for many years a trusted employee of the Tecumseh State Savings bank, has confessed to officials of the American Surety company of Detroit to the looting of the vaults of the local bank and made restitution of \$165 in silver and \$6,000 in negotiable securities he had taken from the vault.

Lansing—The state department of conservation, now in supervision over seven hundred and fifty thousand acres of land, of which three hundred and fifty thousand are covered with timber, according to the report of the department up to the period of Dec. 1, 1924. Of the total acreage, approximately 50 per cent of the land now held by the state reverts through delinquent tax payments.

Detroit—Judge Franz C. Kuhn, president of the Michigan Bell Telephone company, has announced the intention of his company to comply with the temporary order issued by the state public utilities commission, reducing the rate schedule on residential phone service in Detroit. This is reassuring because of the two years' litigation which developed over the last telephone rate cut ordered by the utilities commission.

Kalamazoo—Charged with patrolling his beat in taxicabs and street cars, Luman A. Martin, a patrolman, has been summarily dismissed by order of Chief Ben F. Taffee. The officer was accused of dividing his time between the Michigan Central big race room and the lobby of a local hotel, the terminal of his beat, six blocks apart. During one other cold spell two years ago, Martin suspended for looting and spending his time on street cars.

Wyandotte—The voters of Wyandotte will be given a second opportunity this April to pass a \$250,000 bond issue to provide for a new city water system. The proposal was defeated last fall. Mayor H. S. Amiot said the passage of this proposal is necessary as the first step in the program of development, which includes the finishing of the water and sewerage system, the erection of a new municipal building and the improvement of the water front. He strongly urges the passage of this bond issue for the betterment of the city.

APPETIZING FOODS

During winter oranges and other citrus fruits are most reasonable in price and most abundant. Their delicious flavor stimulates and refreshes the appetite and their color adds to any dish or table.



For the first course eat orange cup, filled with sliced orange, a bit of grapefruit, seeded and peeled grapes and rind-divided sugar sirup, is especially well liked.

Although the orange is delicately acid, it has an alkaline reaction which makes it especially valuable in counteracting foods that produce acids.

As a dessert, oranges make an excellent sweet course, containing sugar which is partially digested. After an elaborate and heavy dinner a light, easily digested dessert is a necessity.

Orange Mint Cup.—Take one cupful each of sliced grapefruit pulp, orange pulp and pineapple. Mix and sprinkle with a little sugar and lemon juice—or better a lemon sirup, made by cooking sugar, lemon juice and rind with a little water. Chill and fill halves of oranges, set into sherbet cups, or simply fill the glasses with the fruit mixture. At the last moment sprinkle with finely minced mint and garnish with a sprig of fresh mint in the center of the glass.

Orange Meringues.—Separate into sections four oranges, without breaking the membrane. Make a sirup of one-half cupful each of lemon juice, water and any canned fruit juice, boiling five minutes. Add the oranges, cover and cool. This is a complete and may be served just as it is. Place these sirup-covered orange sections on rounds of sponge cake, moisten with a little of the sirup. Prepare a meringue, using two egg whites, two tablespoons of powdered sugar and a tablespoon of the compote sirup. Cover the oranges and set in a moderate oven to brown. Serve cold with some of the compote as a garnish.

Orange Ice Cream.—Cook two cupfuls of water with one cupful of sugar, cool and add one cupful of orange juice, a pinch of thin cream, a pinch of salt. Freeze as usual.

Winter Fruits.

The orange is especially prized during the winter months, when it is at its best and most plentiful.

The winter fruit, being rich and heavy, needs such fruit to keep the body in good condition. All citrus fruits contain fruit salts and acids which are most beneficial to health.

A pint of orange juice contains almost the same number of food units as three-quarters of a pint of milk. Orange juice is quickly assimilated and because of its action on the bowels, is one of the finest digestive regulators.

Its beautiful color makes the orange particularly enjoyed in winter, when color in foods is most appreciated. As a garnish the orange has wide possibilities. Baskets, cups, flowers, preserved and served as a confection, or as receptacles for salads or jellies.

A sherbet is easily prepared using citrus fruit, orange or lemon juice, sugar sirup and water, or if a richer sherbet is desired, the cream or milk to place of the water. Serve in orange cups with roast meats or fowl.

Candies of various kinds flavored with these fruit juices are both wholesome and delicious. Plain fondant, flavored with lemon or orange juice and made into patties like the watergreen or peppermint are well liked.

Turkish delight prepared with gelatin, sugar sirup and fruit juices, cooled in a fat dish and cut into oblongs then rolled in powdered sugar is an other very popular confection.

Glaced fruits are particularly well liked during the cold weather. Orange sections, kumquats, tangerines and lemon quarters are very attractive. These should be eaten the same day made, as they soften in the air quickly.

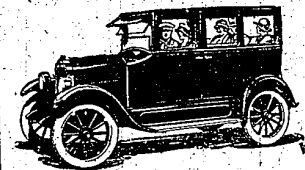
To prepare the sirup for glaced fruits take two cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of boiling water, one-third of a teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Boil until the sirup begins to color light brown, be to 24 degrees F., then dip each piece quickly, keeping the sirup over hot water.

Waffles.—Fudge.—Cook three squares of chocolate, one-half cupful of milk and one-third of a cupful of brown sugar for ten minutes; add one teaspoonful of vanilla. Cream one cupful of light brown sugar and one-half cupful of butter. Add one-half cupful of sour milk, two well-beaten eggs and two cupfuls of sifted pastry flour, one teaspoonful of soda and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt. To this add the above cooked mixture. Combine and bake in layers for twenty minutes. Put together with chocolate fudge frosting.
