Forest Service Bureau

More than 1,800 miles of roads and nearly 5,000 miles of trails were constructed within or adjacent to the 14 national forests during the fiscal year ending June 30,1024, according to the annual report made by the chief of agriculture. In addition maintenance work was performed of 7,425 miles of roads and 32,105 miles of trails. Including the construction work

mouls and 22,165 miles of trails. Including the construction work completed within the last year, the total mileage of national forest roads constructed by June 30 of this year stood at 8,707 and the total mileage of trails at 15,855.

The sum of \$0.351,142 was expended, on the road; and trail work of the forest service during the last fiscal year, the report says. This sum was augmented by funds from co-operative agencies, such as states, counties and local organizations. local organizations.
