Church Plans Day Camp For Lutheran Convention

Small "family" groups made up of children entering the fifth through seventh grades will build their own "homes in the woods" as Riv-erside Park Nursery and Day Care Center expands its sum-mer program to include school age children.

Rev. Robert McFarling, director of the program at Riverside Park Church of God, credited the increased demand in what was formerly a pre-school program for the deci-sion to expand to include all ages through high school.

Older children will meet at the center, 1171 Newburgh, at 9 a.m. daily, and will be taken to a site near Cherry Hill and Newburgh to build their camp. The date for opening the camp will be announced later.

THE YOUNGSTERS will set THE YOUNGSTERS will set up canvas shelters and build furniture from logs as well as participate in outdoor activities.

Third and fourth graders will be taken on hikes and partici-pate in hobby and craft activi-ties in the same area. Lunch and two snacks will be served during the day.

High school students will form a Youth Corps to perform service activities in the community and assist at the center. Participants in the corps will be eligible to attend the Church of God International Convention in Dallass Texas, later in the summer. The center will pay part of their expenses.


