Congolese To Speak In Covenant

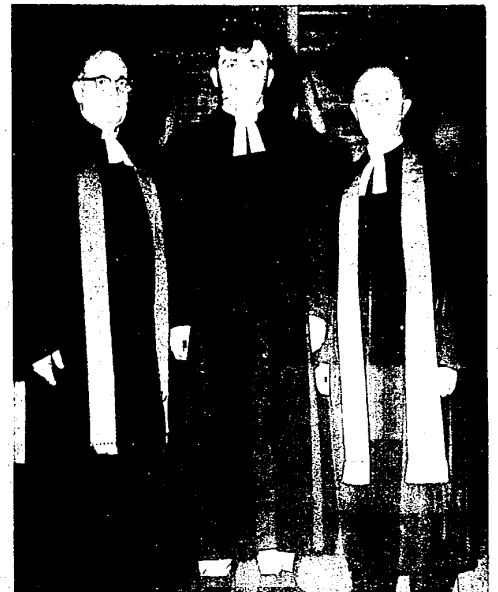
A Congolese national, Petro Duale, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, June 25, at a service in the Evangelical Covenant Church in Detroit.

Duale, from Geneva, Congo, was invited to the United States by the Evangelical Church denomination as part of its 80th Anniversary of overseas mission work. He is participating in the denomination's annual meeting in Chicago and visiting local churches in the U.S.

Duale serves as legal representative with the Evangelical Church of the Ubungu/Mongala in northwest Congo. In this capacity he works very closely with the president of the church, serving as liaison between the church and the Congo government.

Born at Karawa in the Congo in 1932, he was converted during primary school days at about age eight and was baptized a year later. He furthered his education at a local Bible School and in 1963 received a four-year diploma from the Congo Christian Institute at Bolenge. He married his wife, Olingo Divine, have six boys and three girls.

Serving as interpreter for Duale will be the Rev. Franklin Lindquist, Congover Missionary to Congo. The public is invited.

Humanistic Group Prepares First Meeting

The Society for Humanistic Judaism will hold its first annual meeting June 28 to 31 in the Northland Inn, Southfield.

Participating will be members of the Birmingham Temple, Temple Beth Or of Dearfield and Westport Congregation of Westport, Conn.

The conference will provide an opportunity for Jewish Humanists to participate in informal dialogue with each other and plan for joint action.

They hope to develop standards for ethical behavior, political action, religious education, holiday services and poetic services.

THE FRIDAY evening service, only one open to the public, will be held in Robert Frost Junior High School, Oak Park, and will include original poetry and a panel discussion on "What Is Different About Humanistic Judaism?"

Other sessions, open to those who register by calling the Birmingham Temple office, 5-8-5191, will include informal discussions and panels Saturday and Sunday and a Saturday evening banquet.

Rabbi Sherwin Wine of Birmingham Temple will be banquet speaker on the topic: "The Future of Humanistic Judaism."

THE LOCAL RABBI recently described the new movement, originated by his congregation six years ago.

In an interview, he said: "We feel we have a large number of Jews today are alienated from Judaism and we feel we are providing a viable alternative work for them."

"Aesthetic man responds to nature and the universe of which he is a part," he says. "Especially important are those aspects he can't challenge."

"Our response to it is through the use of a religious calendar," he says. The calendar is the traditional Jewish calendar based on the lunar and not the solar year.

"More important is the ethical response," says Rabbi Wine. Our humanistic values are shared with people who are not Jewish.

Catholics Plan Special Camp For Deaf Children

Parents and Friends of the Deaf (PFDD) organization of the metropolitan area will sponsor a summer camp for deaf and hearing and deaf children this summer at Oxford.

A Catholic organization, PFDD will operate the camp for two sessions, June 28-July 11 and July 12-July 25 on Oxford property of the Dominican Sisters of Oxford. Fee is \$50 for each two-week session. Children will live in the sisters' retreat house and in a dormitory.

THE CAMP will be open to children ranging in age from seven to 15. Director will be the Rev. John Larsen of St. John Catholic Seminary, Plymouth.

Camp activities will include swimming, caption films for the deaf, arts and crafts, hiking, sports, dramatic performances and religious instruction.

PFDD was organized to stimulate interest in activities of deaf children with its long-range goal: the establishment of a Catholic high school for the deaf in Detroit.

Although the camp is sponsored by a Catholic group, non-Catholics are welcome to attend.
