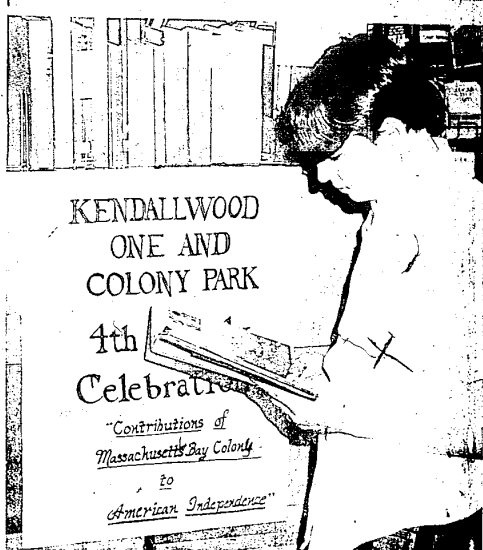

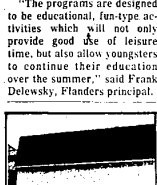
PTA Announces Flanders Agenda
