acknowledge this. But more and more are also realizing that sound morals cannot successfully be divorced from true religion. The Bible says: "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." Thus it places religion before us as our essential factor in education. The Bible also distinguishes between mere knowledge and wisdom. Without a constant regard for the true God who has revealed Himself to us through Christ, without a clear understanding of His expressed will, and without a keen desire to do it, that is to say, without an ever-present fear of the Lord, one may know much and still be ignorant of it, and and the best use to which knowledge may be put. To know the latter and to do it, is the beginning—the very first principle—of wisdom. And note well, it is wisdom that we should seek for ourselves and for our children. From time immemorial, therefore, the Lutheran Church has maintained schools in the interest of an education which has its support in heaven and promotes true wisdom. By means of such an education it has aimed constantly to give direction to knowledge and to make it a power for good.

It is well to train the mind. It is likewise well to care for the body. But the soul must not be neglected. The soul must be brought into intimate communion with God through Christ. It must be led to know and to love God. And it must be persuaded to utilize the God-given powers of the entire man for the service of God and mankind. This is the Christian ideal of education. It is the ideal that has caused many Lutheran parents to invest heavily in church schools. A well-rounded education, an education which takes into consideration the body, the mind, and the soul is what they seek and sacrifice for. What is your ideal?
