MANY NEW STATE LAWS NOW IN EFFECT

About 250 new laws became effective last Friday. Although the legislature passed 393 bills, many of them were appropriation measures, were given immediate effect for other reasons or were vetoed by the governor.

The new marriage statute providing application for a marriage license must be made five days in advance of the date of delivery has attracted most attention.

City police officials charged with enforcing the new pistol regulation bill can make arrests for failure to comply. The law provides all guns less than 30 inches in length must be registered.

If state, county, or township road work has been held up because owners of property will not sell the needed right-of-way the highway officials can now take possession of the property in question and fight out condemnation proceedings in the court afterwards.

The statute exempts property on which a dwelling house is located but provides a rapid condemnation proceeding for this

class of property also.

It is under the provision of this law that the state authorities expect to be able to secure a relocation of Grand River road at this point, despite the objections of some property owners. Reputable attorneys who have been looking into this law closely are of the opinion that it is unconstitutional.

Any merchant who plans to remain at his present location less than six months must have a license as a transient or be subject to arrest. Another new law provides for licensing transient merchants and declares all persons transient who remain less than six months in one location.

Farmers cannot burn their hedges or brush land hereafter without first obtaining permission of a county supervisor or fire warden.

Motorists must take all emblems of clubs or lodges of which they are not members off the radiators of their machines or be subject to arrest.

"Ambulance chasers," legal enthusiasts who urge injured persons to let them prosecute a claim for damages are put out of business. The new statute makes solicitation of personal injury claims a misdemeanor.

The unlucky motorist who has a mortgaged car outside the state of Michigan is subject to prosecution if he leaves it out for thirty days without permission of the mortgagee. A new statute makes this offense a felony.

All local game and fish laws enacted to meet conditions in different localities become effective at midnight Thursday. Several closed and special seasons are established. Netting fish is prohibited in several places.

In addition, scores of other statutes applicable to certain individuals are now in force. Changes are made in legal procedure, in criminal statutes amended to inflict heavier penalties in many instances; laws relating to real estate, insurance and other business are now in effect.
