Mr. and Mrs. Milton Parker visited their son, Ray Huron, Sunday. He is recovering nicely from his severe burns by electricity.

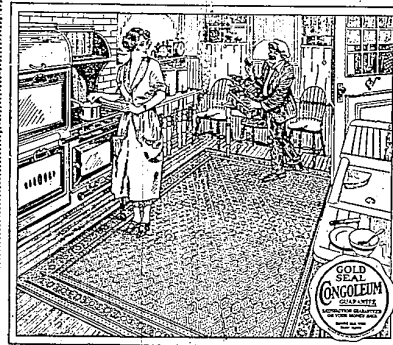

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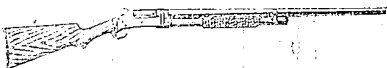
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
