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THE COMMUNITY Commercial will be for business property with shallow depth, located on heavily traveled streets and near residential areas, explains City Mapage John Dinan.

Uses to be allowed in the Community Commercial zone are almost identical to allowed uses businessee as auto sales. Prohibited uses will include such businessee as auto sales bump shops, tire sales, auto or cycle rentals, car washes service stations, mobile home sales, taverns which do not serve food, drive-in restaurants or any business with outdoor displays.

Also proposed for Community Commercial are properties on south side of Grand River from Gill to Drake: and American Legion property on south side of Grand River at Lakeway.

THE PLANNING commission's downtown redevelopment committee, chared by Richard Tupper, is studying the possibility of forming an advisory committee formed from representatives of the business community and residents.
