

Shortt gets 1st Hawk win

Ron Shortt finally got his first victory at Farmington Harrison. Shortt, who coached volleyball at Farmington the past seven seasons, had lost his first four matches with the Hawks.

That string came to an end Wednesday as the Hawks downed Walled Lake Western, 15-12, 15-13.

"It felt good for me, and even better for the kids," Shortt said.

Karen Sklar led the way for the Hawks. She was successful on all 15 of her serves and all 18 of her spikes. She scored two service aces and 28 percent of her spikes were kills.

Laura Ambrose and Jennifer Hughes also played well for the Hawks.

"Western is a very good team. I'm very happy with the way we played," said Shortt.

Harrison goes on the road this week, taking on Walled Lake Central tonight and Canton Wednesday.

NORTH FARMINGTON got the word Wednesday that they were rated No. 10 in Class A by the Michigan High School Coaches Association poll. They celebrated by beating a good Garden

City team, 15-8, 15-12.

"We really needed this win to get back into the league swing," said North coach Sandy Lubieniecki.

North lost its league-season opener to Redford Thurston. They are 8-2 overall, 1-1 in the Northwest Suburban League.

North got strong serving performances from Patki Kozicki and Susette Greenberg. Kozicki scored eight points on her serves, three on aces, and

Greenberg was successful on all 14 of her serves.

Mary Kozicki had a good game at the net for the Raiders, hitting on 12 of 15 spikes with five aces.

North travels to Redford Union tonight and to Livonia Franklin Wednesday.

FARMINGTON came out flat against Plymouth Salem Wednesday, and the Rocks won, 16-14, 15-15, 15-9.

"It was just a bad, bad match," said coach Kim O'Neill.

Farmington (4-2) hosts Livonia Churchill Monday, and travels to Dearborn for a non-league match Wednesday.

ington coach Kim O'Neill. "It's been the story of our season. We don't have poise like North Farmington has. They showed a lot of patience, they played smart and consistent. That's what we have to work towards."

Said Lubieniecki: "Julie (Pistole) came off the bench and really gave us a lift. And the turning point in the first game was when Patki got hot. Mary finally got hot in the second game and really started hitting the ball."

Lubieniecki said she was impressed with the vast improvement shown by both Harrison and Farmington. After it was over, the Raiders collectively sighed with relief and walked out of the Farmington Training Center with another city championship. No massive victory celebration, no whooping and hollering. They were just glad to be going home.

Hawks earn a regional berth

For the first time in four years, the Farmington Harrison gymnastics team will compete in the state regional tournament.

The Hawks earned a berth at the March 10 regional by defeating Westland John Glenn, 119-110.65 last Wednesday. It was the fourth time this season the Hawks have scored more than 115 points, a prerequisite for regional qualification.

The Hawks are 3-3 this season, and the success has been somewhat of a surprise to coach Kim Dennis.

"I keep thinking it's a dream, and I'm going to wake up some day and our scores will be back in the 80s where they belong," she said, not altogether seriously. "We must be better than I think. But, really, Tracey (Solomon) is the only club-trained girl we have. She competes all year-round."

It was Solomon, just a freshman, who again paced the Hawk win. She took first place in three of the four events and second in the other.

Solomon won the vault with a 8.35, the uneven parallel bars with a 7.7, and the floor exercise with an 8.6. She placed second in the balance beam with a 7.25.

Hawk teammate Jill Birska won the beam with a 7.4. Birska also took third in the vault (7.85), bars (6.75) and floor exercise (7.95).

Freshman Julie Runk placed second in the floor exercise with an 8.15, giving the Hawks a one-two-three sweep. Jamie Lyons took third in the beam (7.2), again giving the Hawks a sweep of the top three spots.

"Not bad for a bunch of novices," said Dennis.

John Glenn got seconds from Mary Kubick (8.2 in the vault) and Kelly Jackson (7.15 in the bars).

The Hawks host Southfield-Lathrup tonight.

NORTH FARMINGTON won another thriller Wednesday, nipping Dearborn 124.25-124.15.

The win improves the Raiders record to 5-1, and the 124.25 points is the most earned by the team this year.

Eileen Murtaugh was the all-around individual winner, taking both the vault (8.75) and the beam (8.15). Murtaugh was third in the floor exercise (8.3) and fourth in the bars (7.6).

The Raiders' victory was sealed by the scintillating floor exercise performance by Dana Kebrde. Kebrde had taken second in the vault (8.55) and third in the beam (8.0), prior to the floor event.

Kebrde's score of 8.65 in the floor exercise tipped the scales for North. Lisa Brundel placed in all four events to help the Raiders. She was fourth in the floor exercise (8.05), fifth

in the vault (7.45), fifth on the beam (7.45) and sixth in the bars (7.25).

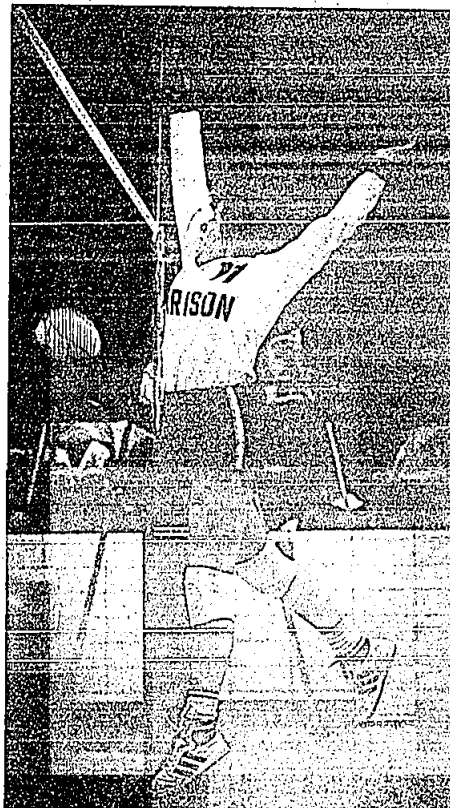
Kara Karbu (fourth in vault, 7.55) and Marilyn Dunn (fifth in bars, 7.54) also scored for North.

"We performed much better than we had been, even though we lost," said coach Mary Beth Feeney. "Grosse Pointe is really strong."
