Cinematography takes adventure out of ordinary

"Never Cry Woll," based on Canadian nuthor Farley Mowat's best-seller, is beautifully photographed. The storyline, however, is prettyl dippy and Director Carroll Ballard ("The Black Stallion") might better have given us a credible hero with some knowledge of Arguic survival tecenique.

Biologist Tyler (Charles Martin Smith) is sent to the Arctic by an un-named government agency * Project Lupis* to study wolves who are attacking and destroying caribon berds. Stereotypically tough, bard-drinking bush-pilol Rozie, played with great gusto by Brian Denneby, dumps Tyler and his supplies in the middle of a forcea lake.

As far as film realism goes, we're in trouble right here. Long ago "Nanok of the North" taught us that the Arctic afternoon priority is finding shelter. Not so our friend Tyler.

He sits around ruminating about isolation and what be's supplet to be doing up there. Finally he checks the supplies furnished by the signal of the site of the state with lots of canned apparagus and a shortwave radio picking up Russian music.

Tyler never would have trekked the Arctic at all if he hadn't
found shelter the first day. After Roale the pilot left, Tyler is asved
from his own stupidity and lack of preparation by an Estimo bunter-hero type, Octek (Zachary Ittimangnan), who appears on and off
throughout the film with his adopted son, Mice (Sannson Jorab).
At least they had enough sense to come in out of the cold. Octek's
philosophy, lore and survival techniques saw Tyler's body and soul
as he coms to grips with nature, man's encreachment, and his own
immaturity.

THE FILM PROVIDES some interesting voice-over narration by Tyler. Gradually he understands the power of nature in face of civilization's threat. Even Tyler eventually learns to live with mans Isnignificance. Mike and Ootek show him the way.

The cinematography is well worth the price of admission, as are the extended wildlife sequences. Him Narita, director of photography, provides ample and gorgeous Arctic panoramas. Vast expanses of some are intermittently punctuated with forest patches and rock outcropplings as Rosie's plane ferries Tyler to his remote location.

location. The storms, the animals and the natural growth of the brief Arctic summer are pleasurable to view. Man's insignificance and animal resilience are photographically strong. Several secence set Tyler as a tiny creature against the vast and snowy Arctic expanse. The animals are clearly photographed in close view, cavorting and surviving, fatalistically serence as they were meant to be.

Although very well done, the photography tends to over use the extreme closeup. One such shot of an awakening eye is probably sufficient. Tyler's experiment with a mice diet is effectively shot in closeup as the living compatriots of his lunch peek out accusingly.

19, All told, "Never Cry Wolf" is levely to look at but confusing to follow. If you don't expect a realistic storyline, you'll probably enjoy this Arctic animal story.

Guide to fun was fun to do

West Bloomfield resident Dick Par-ker, who is one of the editors of the fifth edition of the Detroit Guide, said putting the guidebook together was mostly a labor of love.

"It's been seiling very well, in the more affuent areas," be said, Despite good sales, said Parker, the editors have worked on the book more for the joy of it than financial reward, which is slight.

slight. The large 475-page paperback is written in a sassy style and covers just about every aspect of fun and games in metropolitan Detroit. Its capsule descriptions give the lowdown on where to go and what to do, at bars and restaurants, clubs, museums, galleries,

theaters, shops and sports arenas.
The book is chatty, readable and tells you what's good and bad about places, even those with big followings. Restaurants are rated, with stars, for the first time in this edition.

PARKER WORKED on the first edition of the guidebook, originally published in 1970 and updated in two subsequent printings. Martin Flachhoff did the 1974 edition himself, it had two printings. The editions, who include John W. Grant, began to gather information in 1980 for the fifth edition. The Detroit Guide at \$8.95 is available in area bookstores and drugstores including Detry's and Chaptery's.


Parker said changes listed in the new guidebook include "a greater variety of continental-type restaurants than there

used to be." He said Detroit's ethnic eateries are still around in great num-ber but today there are more Middle Eastern ones.

Parker also noted the arts are expanding. 'In 1974, there was only one resident live theater in Defroit. Now there are live or six,' he said. 'On the music scene, jarr has expanded and there are at least a dozen different clubs. The number of art galleries has exploded.'

Fischhoff, a public relations executive, is publisher of the Detroit Guide, Grant, fullime editor on the book. Both Fischoff, and Grant are Detroit residents. Both worked with Parker in the late 1860s on the student newspaper, the South End, at Wayne State University in Detroit.
