

Candidates ready for Hills council interviews

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since 1977 and is employed with the Arthur Young & Co.'s central management services office in Detroit. He has had no government experience, according to his resume.

Burwell served on Farmington Hills City Council 1980-1984. He was defeated in his bid last November for re-election. He was mayor in 1982. As a councilman, the attorney served as vice

chairman of the Southwest Oakland Cable Commission.

HE ALSO served as a liaison for the Farmington Area Advisory Commission and Farmington Youth Assistance.

Chase has lived in Farmington Hills since November 1988. He is a vice president and controller for Mark Young Heating and Cooling Inc. A former member of the Governor's Science and Technology Commission, Chase

says he does not intend to seek election to the council in November 1984. Because he has served as a consultant to city and regional government, Chase says he has knowledge of topics such as water quality, park planning, central business revitalization and reuse of buildings.

Dillon is a 10-year Jaycee member and president of the Camelot Court Association. He is a former president of Local 88, United Brewery Workers. Since 1978, Dillon has been self-employed as a bread distributor in Madison Heights. He has employment experience in management and merchandising.

Gray, who could not be reached for comment, has yet to provide the city clerk with a resume of his qualifications. But in a letter of application, Gray indicated that he has lived in Farmington Hills for several years and has "always desired to take a more active part in our city government."

Higgins moved to Farmington Hills last August. She says she has "a broad-based background in educational administration, small business administration and human services." She also has served in elected and appointed positions for Western Michigan University and in state and national professional organizations. She holds master's and bachelor's degrees in music and most recently worked as coordinator for WmU's Music Therapy Clinic. Higgins also has employment experience

as a business manager and legal and executive secretary.

KURZEJA is a 22-year resident of the city's southeast section. She serves on the Farmington Hills Rehabilitation Loan Board and Housing Commission and is a notary public. Her city involvement includes serving as a legislative aide for the Advisory Board to the Farmington Area Commission on Aging, a member of the city's Citizens Participation Plan (for Community Development Block Grants), and a member of the international ad hoc committee on senior housing. Kurzeja is a business administration and accounting student at Madonna College.

Ortman is a former five-year township board member who served for two years on the city council. An attorney, Ortman said that perhaps it should be pointed out that there are no lawyers on the council. In 1972, Ortman was a nominee to the Michigan Supreme Court. He is also an author and editor for national, state and local journals.

McDonnell has lived in Farmington Hills since 1965 and has been actively involved as president of both the Normandy Hills and Quaker Valley Farms homeowners associations. He also helped organize the area's first drug abuse program now known as the Farmington Area Advisory Commission. McDonnell is a self-employed real estate appraiser and member of the Western Wayne-Oakland County Board

of Realtors and the Michigan Real Estate Association and National Association of Realtors.

Primeau is an attorney who has served two years as president and one year as vice president of the Glen Orchard Civic Association. He is a former West Bloomfield High School teacher. Primeau also is a past president of the Livonia Bar Association.

Rompa is a former 11-year (1970-1981) Farmington Hills police officer and sergeant. He is former trustee of the city's pension system committee. Now an attorney, he is employed as manager of personnel and industrial relations for a medium-sized supplier to the automotive industry. He is the corporation's chief spokesman in grievance and negotiation meetings and is responsible for the firm's legal work. Rompa is the vice president of the Livingston-Oakland County Credit Union board of directors.

Sever, who owns his own Farmington Hills printing firm, is a twice unsuccessful city council contender. He is a

national Jaycee vice president and past president and chairman of the Michigan Jaycees board of directors. He is a member of the Oakland County Republican Committee and served as a Republican precinct delegate for four years.

Vagnozzi, a Democratic activist, has lived in Farmington Hills since 1960. He has served on the Farmington Board of Education, Michigan United Way Public Relations Committee and is a past president of the Farmington Area PTA Council. He is a founding member of the Farmington Community Center board of directors and was recently named to the board of directors of the Friends of the Farmington Community Library. Vagnozzi is a member of the Farmington Hills Committee to Improve Voter Participation and the Farmington Area Commission on Aging.

Zolton, a city resident since 1976, is an associate professor of communications and theater at Mercy College of Detroit.
