Feb. 3, any amount of money on the weight loss of their favorite celebrity. All proceeds will be delivered to the celebrity's designated charity.

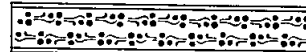
The total weight lost by each celebrity during this event will be announced after the "weigh out."
