The work appears to be paying off. The Raiders, rated No. 2 in Observerland, are 9-1 on the season and, after drowning lowly Redford Union 126-43 last Thursday, are 2-0 in the Northwest Suburban League.

The Raiders won all but two of the 11 events against the Panthers.

"We had nice intensity," coach Tim Domke said. "We never should have lost the lead, but we took some bad shots. But our intensity was super."

OLSM, now 11-11, won the game at the free throw line by converting 19 of 25. Aquinas was a poor 10 of 25 from the stripe.

David Howard's 21 points was best for the Eagles. David James, Tony Scotti and Barry Eberhardt added 10 apiece. Joe Van Rosmalen bagged 18 for Aquinas (12-7).

OLSM WON DESPITE a lineup minus a pair of starters because of injuries. Larry Brundtke, who had surgery to repair a broken nose, did play some and is expected to see more extensive action with the help of a protective mask.

But the good news for OLSM fans is that Steve Kopicki may soon return. Kopicki tore ligaments in his knee three weeks ago and it was expected at the time he'd be lost for the season.

However, the knee is responding to therapy and surgery may be postponed until after the season. Kopicki, a 6-foot-6 forward who transferred from San Diego State, would greatly strengthen the Eagles inside game.

If both return, Domke thinks his team's chances for a berth in the NAIA district tournament would be greatly improved. As it is, Domke feels his squad is in pretty good shape.
