# Pot of gold awaits groups

HERE'S A pot of gold at the end of the Winter Carnival rainbow. rainbow.
All groups that hold money-

making events during the carnival are asked to donate 10 percent of their prof-its to a community fund that is used for the coming year's Winter Carnival, ac-

cording to Shirley Bryant, coordinator of the Birmingham School's Community Education program.

The amount of money that the participating groups give to the fund is done on an honor system basis, Bryant said. Apart from the Winter Carnival, the

funds also are used to help finance com-munity activities in the city. An example is a recent luncheon for volunteer senior citizens in the school system, she said.

"It's kind of a community pot that people throw money in, and it is used for other things that are community activities," she said.

There is more than \$3,000 in the fund this year, Bryant said, so the Winter Carnival is now able to support itself.

During the Winter Cornival's first year, the Birmingham City Commission and the Birmingham Board of Education jointly contributed \$1,000.
