

While the CDBG program guidelines allow 20% of the total grant to be used for administrative costs, it is believed that approximately 14% of the \$352,000 or \$35,000 should cover the costs of administrative program. Administrative costs include salaters, materials, supplies, and services necessary to administre Block Grant (undo, maintain records, process projects and manage the Housing Rehabilation Frogram.
