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CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR MEETINGS

March 26, 1984

Mayor Williams opened the public hearing meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council at 7:30 P.M. on March 26, 1984. Members present: Alkalath, Dolan, Dudley, Soronen, Williams and Wolf. Absent: Aniolov. Other present: City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns, Assistant City Manager Bill Costick and City Attorney Poehman. Council enacted Zoning Map Amendment C63-318 (ZB 1-1-84) rezoning a part of land on north side of Thirteen Mile Road, east of Ardmore Drive (Sdwell pt of 23-03-476-038) from RA-1 to P-1.

Council adopted Resolution No. 1 for Special Assessment District for pavement resurfacing project for Scottsdale Road in Section 1 and Resolution No. 2 setting the Public Hearing on Determination of April 16, 1984.

Council adopted Resolution No. 1 for Special Assessment District for paving Eleven Mile Road between Hunt Club Boulevard and Drake Road in Sections 17 and 20 and Resolution No. 2 setting Public Hearing date of April 16, 1984.

Request of transfer of ownership of 1983 Class C licensed business with Dance Permit, located at 22505 Nine Mile Road from Be My Guest, Inc. was deleted from the agenda.

Council recommended that Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals rotate their chairmanships in the future.

Council approved transfer of ownership of Class C licensed business with Entertainment Permit located at 28990-92 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Hills, from M.E.G. Foods, Inc. (Honey Tree) to Loukas Foods, Inc.

Council discussed the number of public hearings set for April 16, 1984 and scheduled two items for April 30.

Council adjourned consideration of project area and project district area for Carrefour (Muirwood Office Project) and the appointment of additional Economic Development Corporation members for the project, pending further information from the Economic Development Corporation.

Council approved EDC Resolution No. 1 for project area and project district area for New Orchard Investment Company project located on west side of Orchard Lake Road, south side of Firwood.

Appointments of Harlem Morris and Donald Meade were confirmed as EDC project directors for New Orchard Investment Company.

Council agreed to hold Executive Session immediately following the meeting to discuss pending litigation.

Council awarded bid for pilot program for contracting for traffic lane striping services to General Pavement Marking Company at cost of \$8,729.61.

Council approved Contract with Oakland County Road Commission and Michigan Department of Transportation for engineering design services for paving Twelve Mile Road from Middlebelt to Farmington Road.

Resolution was adopted to reduce the water rates from \$7.57 to \$7.50 per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumed.

Meeting adjourned at 9:35 P.M.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:03 p.m. on March 19, 1984, by Mayor Yoder in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Mayor Yoder, Councilmen Bennett, Hartsock, Tupper, Walker.
OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Director Seifert, G. Horner, Attorney Actio, Attorney Farhat, City Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Bushey.

Minutes of previous meetings were approved.
Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council adopted a resolution not to renew the Class "C": Liquor License for Pal Joey's, Inc. d.b.a. "Boozergens".

Council held a Public Hearing to review the Land and Water Conservation Grant Application which would provide funds to improve the City's recreation and park facilities. Council approved the pre-application and authorized its submission to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Council approved the ten meter run through Farmington requested by the Farmington YMCA for May 19, 1984.

Council adopted the following resolutions:

- Requesting the introduction of legislation which would give local communities additional authority in major changes and expansions of previously approved Class C licensed establishments;
- Granting permission to apply for a State Permit to close Grand River for the Memorial Day Parade, May 26, 1984;
- Authorizing City Manager to enter into an agreement with the Farmington School District to construct the Raphael Water Main.

Council declined to decide on a new bonding issue for the Caddell Drain until they have more information on how Farmington Hills' total drain projects will affect the City of Farmington.

Council established a Study Session for 7:30 p.m., April 5, 1984, to consider a revised policy on community sidewalks.

Public comments were heard.
The following appointments were made:
Ernest Saunter - Library Board - 4 year term;
Nancy Leonard - Historical Commission - 3 year term;
Charles Carwell - Historical Commission - 3 year term.

Council received the Department of Public Safety Annual Report for 1983. Monthly bills were approved for payment.
Meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.
