50.000 Whoppers Waiting'

A 51-yound chinook salmon washed ashore recently near Meyer and the control of the Department of the Department of the Department of the Department of Natual Resources.

Along with earlier reports of 25 to 30-pound chmooks taken this year from Lake Michigan, the latest and biggest fish prompted Dr. Wayne H. Tody, chief of the department's fish-ceries division, to say:

"This, apparently, is the year of the coho in Michigan There probably are \$50.00 whoppers out there waiting to be caught. And many of them will be caught this summer.

Tody explained that unlike cohos, which spend two summers prowing in the big lake, chinooks, spend as many as fixe to syewn summers before they mive into streams to spawn and the. This additional growing time accounts for their exceptionals size.

They are the tabled king satimon of the West Coast where they grow to 90 or more pounds. Department fisheries men are hopeful that Lake Michigan chinooks may attain similar weights. We know they're out there
