

Harrison has no contest against C'ville

Talk about a rout.

The Farmington Harrison tennis team not only won every match from the seven contests, the Hawks surrendered just three games.

"There wasn't much of a test here," said Hawk coach Berni Goldstein, whose team has been atop the Western Lakes tennis standings the last four seasons, losing out to Livonia Stevenson last year.

Freshman Ken Davidson, brother of Harrison's girls' tennis ace Kelly Davidson, beat C'ville's Matt Schwab, 6-2, 6-1 in No. 1 singles. Those three games

were the Trojans only victories — the Hawks scored straight 6-0, 6-0 victories the rest of the way.

In No. 2 singles, sophomore Mark Rakocy blanked Kevin Norris, 6-0, 6-0. In No. 3 singles, senior Steve Thomas won over Ken Lindsey. It was junior Brad Hack in No. 4 singles defeating Tie VanZandt.

Farmington boxer wins bout

Members of the Livonia Boxing Club gave a good account of themselves at the 1984 Detroit Golden Gloves Tournament before a sparse turnout of 400 fans at the University of Michigan-Dearborn Fieldhouse.

Livonians competed in four title bouts, winning three and losing one.

In the 125-pound division/Open Class, Livonia's Mike Dardini stopped Larry Bradley of the Detroit Spirits in the second round.

Competing in his fourth Gloves, Dardini opted to go inside during the fast-paced first round, trying to inflict damage to the body and head. But Bradley would have no part of it, as he continually tied up his opponent.

Dardini then changed tactics in the next round, still pressing the attack, but punching at long range to avoid the

clinching.

The 20-year-old Farmington resident connected on a number of rights during the round, landing a number of left-hand hooks as well.

MIDWAY through the round, Dardini trapped his opponent along the ropes and scored with a hard right, followed by a left hook, which hurt the Detroit boxer and forcing the referee to issue a standing eight-count.

Less than a minute later, the bout was stopped again as Dardini was declared the winner.

The win puts Dardini in line for a berth in the National Golden Gloves Tournament of Champions.

"Mike has a lot to shoot for in the nationals and we've just heard that this year's national champion will be included in the 1984 Olympic Trials," said Paul Soucy, the Livonia coach.

In the 147-pound/Open Class, LBC's Coleman Reed lost on a third-round disqualification to Kevin Laird of Detroit Johnson.

There was little action during the first two rounds, although Laird gained a slight edge as he outmuscled Reed at close range.

REED WAS hurt near the end of the second round, but had two points taken away by the referee for ducking below the belt.

Laird then won the bout when Reed was disqualified for the same infraction.

In the 156-pound/Senior Novice Division, Livonia's Sanjay Batra, a UM-D student, stopped Richard Craigmilles of the Spirits in the second round.

Batra came out with a furious first-round pace, knocking out Craigmilles' mouthpiece. In the second round, Batra

continued his assault with a series of blows to the body and head. At that point the referee halted the contest and awarded the fight to Batra.

"I'm not too pleased with the way I fought," Batra said, "but I'm glad I let myself get suckered into fighting his fight."

Livonia's third champion is 17-year-old light-middweight Craig Wilson, who scored a first-round knockout against Terry Wilson of the Spirits in a bout that took place on March 31.

COMPETING IN THE Novice Class, Batra used a series of combinations to win the title, the first of any kind this year for an LBC member.

In exhibition bouts, Livonia's Raja Batra was stopped in the second round by Roland Scott Jr. of the Spirits, and Bob Cline, another LBC member, was victorious over Spirit Kaggie Kamathie on a third round TKO.

Falcon lady runners cruise to 2nd victory

The Farmington girls' track team scored its second impressive victory of the season Tuesday, defeating Waterford Mott, 77-51.

The Falcons swept the hurdle events and won three of the four relays en route to the win.

Blondie Lancaster won the 110-yard hurdles in 17.6 and Lori Casaroli took the 330-yard hurdles in 54.8.

Terri Quenneville was the Falcons' lone winner in the field events. She tossed the discus 108-2 for first place.

Kim Steiner won the 440-yard dash in 1:07.6 and Jenny Lindbert took the 2-mile in 12:25.5.

Karen Runyan, Tracey Hule, Jennifer Hadley, and Lancaster teamed to win the 440-yard relay in 54.9.

HADLEY, LAURA Spence, Casaroli, and Sarah Shevlin took the 800 relay in 2:02.9.

In the 2-mile relay, Lindbert, Lynn Looser, Anne Quenneville, and Steiner won in a school record-setting time of 10:56.2. The 2-mile relay is a new event in girls track this season.

"We're so new and the girls have done a real nice job," said veteran Farmington coach Gerry Young. "I think that we have a good chance (at winning the Western Lakes title). But the next couple of meets coming up will give us a lot more information on that subject."

The Falcons travel to perennial league power Livonia Churchill today and host Walled Lake Western Tuesday.

The junior pitcher, a standout in basketball and volleyball, opened the softball season in impressive style Saturday by tossing a no-hitter against Livonia Franklin, 3-0.
