High blood pressure can be controlled by quitting smoking

Each day, people are continually informed about the seriousness of high blood pressure. Whether provided by their physician, friends, relatives or the media, the message is clearly the same. High blood pressure affects one out of every four people, and it can only be controlled, not cured.

One important way to control it is by quitting smoking. Unfortunately, the correlation between high blood pressure and smoking is usually not evident because most people do not know what high blood pressure is and how smoking affects it.

Each person's heart acts as a pump. When the heart contracts, the heart exerts a force which causes oxygen-enriched blood to circulate through the body. As the blood circulates, it presses against the walls of the blood vessels. The force against the blood vessel walls is called the blood pressure.

The blood pressure does not always stay the same, but fluctuates based on

the body's need for increased circulation to specific body parts. For example, if a person is running, there is an increased need for circulation to the lungs and muscles of the arms and legs. The body's response to this need is to make the blood vessels to the other parts of the body become smaller, so that more blood can be sent to the lungs and muscles. When the problem of high blood pressure arises when the pressure on the blood vessel walls, the blood pressure, remains elevated.

THERE ARE two good reasons to quit smoking.

First, the nicotine in cigarettes causes the blood vessels to become smaller. Since this constriction is accomplished naturally upon exertion, smoking increases the constriction two fold causing the blood pressure to become increasingly elevated.

The second reason for quitting is that the carbon monoxide inhaled from the cigarette robs the body of oxygen.

It's White Cane Week

White Cane Week is celebrated this year from April 27 to May 6 when members of International Lions Club throughout the U.S. offer miniature white canes in return for a donation to carry on their work to help the blind.

In this area Farmington-8 Lions will be on main intersections during daylight hours throughout the week.

Money donated to the local club is

used to buy glasses for senior adults, as well as given to Leader Dog School in Rochester; Penrickton Center for Blind Children; Michigan Welcome Home, for the elderly blind; and Vision and Hearing Institute at Beaumont Hospital.

Local club members work in cooperation with Michigan Eye Bank and accept used glasses for recycling.
