Tests for breast cancer offered

Oakland County women have a higher-than-average rate of breast cancer. However, over 90 percent of breast cancer can be detected by women themselves.

More than 10,000 women have received breast exams and expert instruction in breast self-examination by specially trained public-health nurses in Breast Cancer Detection-Education Center, 27725 Greenfield, Southfield. The center also offers a breast-cancer-oriented health history and breast X-ray, if necessary.

Breast cancer is rare under the age of 20 but increases over age 35. The risk is also greater if a woman has a family history of breast cancer, if she has had no children or if she had her first child after age 30.
