she said.

Another participant said, "Hearing you talk about your work gives me courage to say what I've been wanting to say in my work."

Some women told about going back to college or night classes to pursue art studies while juggiling responsibilities as wives and mothers.

One and mothers referred painting eight bours a day, but Shapiro said. 'I love the idea of being able to work a little, bale shownies a little, work a little, bale brownies a little, work a little, bale brownies a little. You'll never make it as an artist without choosing your own time and place."

Then she quoted Adrian Rich who claimed the problem with women is that, 'We never get to name anything. For me, it's not working eight bours a day that makes you an artist, it's naming something that makes you an artist, and Shapiro.

Shapiro recalled having heard a "guy at Rutgers who finished his fecture saying"... and I don't want to see any girlle stuff (apparently referring to the use of fabric or female-world content)."

"I personally hate the term 'self-expression.' There's more to making art than just emotion. You have to have a system. All you have to do is select the akills that are going to represent 'me, now.'"

REFERRING to the trappings of home and family life that mark the traditional female role, Shapiro said, 'I say let's look at them. We're talking about the symbols of the nest; in the 'Tos, to put a handkerchief in a painting was called idiotic.
