## Salem coach Thomann resigns boys cage post

Fred Thomann, who has guided Plymouth Salem boys basketball teams to a 227-49 record over the past 12 seasons, resigned Friday. He will remain as coach of the girls basketball and girls track teams at Salern. Thomann said be quit because the school board and administration have falled to make a commitment to the system's athletic programs.

Ills resignation stems from growing concern by many coaches in the system about what they term lack of support for the athletic program from school district administrators.

On Feb. 8, a panel of coaches went before Plymouth-Canton Community School's board of education and, in a detailed presentation, asked the board for a commitment to the athletic department.

The coaches told the board that without a commitment two things would happen: the immensely successful altheit programs at Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools would rumble and many highly respected by the second of the second commitment from the board. "AT THIS point in time, it's just too difficult for me to continue to coach in this program, based on the lack of commitment on the part of the board of education and central administration of this district." Thomans ald.
