Choosing the cake: decisions, decisions

Many factors must be considered by a bride to be and her parents before they

decide on a cake — the centerpiece of any wedding reception.

Cost, size of the party to be served and type of cake desired are important considerations.

And one area baker has an additional bit of advice: Try a piece before you buy

it.
"One thing that's important is testing
the cake out," said Sharon Koster of
Troy's Bavarian Bakery. "I'd would go
for a sample, definitely."

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Wedding cakes are a speciality at Bavarian, where chefs use 2714 pounds of eggs in their batter which is mixed in 80-

quart bowls.
"Usually, wedding cake servings go by
the number of people you're inviting,"
Koster said. "We charge about 65 cents a serving, so if you're inviting 200 people, that would be \$130."

Popular cakes these days are white, yellow batter, chocolate, cherry nut, banana nut and marble, according to Koster. "Especially popular is a cherry

with butter cream frosting," she added.
Wedding cakes usually are multi-layered affairs. Sometimes the layers are layered affairs. Sometimes the layers are simply stacked on each other, but more often the layers are separated by plastic pillars (on which a deposit is usually paid) supporting the layers.

"Some people don't like plastic on their cakes, so they stack the layers," Koster said. "But pillars make it look taller," Koster said.

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The ornaments which top most wedding cakes add to the cost. "Most people want the tradition bride-and-groom fig-ures," said Koster, who added that a baker sometimes will supply plastic bells, lilies of the valley and roses.
