



# Students Play Game Of World Problems

Beginning Oct. 1, 48 students at the University of Detroit will earn eight credits a term playing a game—the World Game.

Formulated by Buckminster Fuller, an architect and philosopher, the World Game is an exercise in planning for a more equitable and more efficient distribution of the world's resources among all people. Fuller will be a visiting professor at U-D. next year in the School of Architecture.

The students will center their efforts on solving the pollution and urban problems facing the universe.

Fuller views the world as SpaceShip Earth with enough provisions stocked aboard to fulfill the needs of all the passengers. The only problem is distribution.

The student-players at U-D will discuss the world problems and break up into problem-area groups where they will research and formulate possible courses of action. After the courses of action have been decided upon, they will discuss interaction between the courses and plot a final strategy which they will publish.

# Latin Americans Have Secretariat

In recognition of the growing importance of the role of more than 50,000 Latin-Americans in southeastern Michigan, John Cardinal Dearden has instituted a Latin-American secretariat in the Archdiocese of Detroit.

People of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Brazilian and Cuban descent, living in Capac, Adrian, Eire and Mt. Clemens, as well as Detroit, are included among the founding members of the secretariat's advisory board. The board elected Calisto Torres of Adrian as chairman; the Rev. Father Ronald Martus of Detroit as vice chairman; Mrs. Alfredo Aguirre of Detroit as secretary; and Norman Gonzalez of Detroit as treasurer.

On the board's recommendation, Cardinal Dearden appointed Gustavo Gayarrat of Detroit, as full-time executive secretary. He will report directly to the vicar for parishes, Auxiliary Bishop Thomas J. Chabrier. The secretariat's offices will be in the Gabriel Richard Building, Michigan at Washington Blvd., Detroit.

"LATIN-AMERICAN CULTURE has many gifts to bring to all of us," Cardinal Dearden said, "and the new secretariat will perform a useful function in helping to expedite cultural exchanges. Meanwhile we will try to bring to newcomers to our culture guidance in our own ways."

Members of the advisory board agreed to serve for a year, when an election for members will be held throughout the archdiocese. Besides the officers, members are Jorge Castellanos, Sister Marie Ther. Creighton, Alberto Diaz, Sebastian A. Guedes, Israel Leyton, Sister Marie O'Leary and Hermo Vazquez, of Detroit; Antonio Aguinao of Capac, Francisco Cantu and Rev. # Teens 'Let Out' Energy At Newly Opened 'Outlet'

The rain did much to quench the campfire, but not the enthusiasm of the Livonia teens opening up the latest place to go—"The Outlet."

Though the campfire outside was out of commission due to the weather, some girls ventured to burn marshmallows and the rest of the group stayed indoors to play cards, listen to records or just talk.

"The Outlet" was just a 10-day old idea when it opened at St. Timothy's Presbyterian Church on Friday, July 10. The three-year-old church is located at 16700 Newburg in Livonia with enough land to build campfires in the backyard and accommodate a crowd of young people.

Open from 7 to 11 p.m. on Friday and 7 to 10 p.m. on Tuesday, the center is open to all Livonia teens regardless of religious affiliation.

**THE STRATEGY** behind opening "The Outlet" was to give area teens a place to go and something to do with the hopes that volunteer activities will spin off from the night program.

"It seems that with the job opportunities so slight a lot of kids have free time on their hands with not much to do," the Rev. Carl Gunderson, pastor of St. Timothy's said.

The Tuesday and Friday night programs are loosely structured with a card room, a snack bar, and a room with a record player. Teens can organize their own activities and sponsor dances, a coffeehouse or show short films if they want.

Sign-up sheets asking "What do you want to do?" hang in the hall for any suggestions. One possibility is a tutor program where a teen can sign up to learn cooking, sewing, or various arts or crafts and someone can volunteer to teach it.

**POSSIBLE VOLUNTEER** projects include going to Northville State Hospital to "paint the shades gray" to brighten up the rooms, mail packages to soldiers or work with the League for the Handicapped.

"We want things to develop in response to the needs of youth rather than superimposing them," Rev. Gunderson said. "We hope that at the end of the summer they will be able to look back and see that they have had a good time and at the same time have accomplished something."

# Members Want More -- And Less Organization

Several weeks ago, the First United Methodist Church of Farmington asked members of its congregation for their ideas on how to bring the church closer to being an "ideal" religious organization and place of worship.

From the slips of paper filled out at that service and in the following week, a long list of suggestions was compiled by the Rev. Hugh White, pastor, and the Rev. B. Bryce Switzer, associate pastor.

All ideas presented were listed and distributed to congregation members as a guideline for future church action.

Because the wide range of ideas to be found among members of one congregation might well be indicative of thinking among Observer-land church members in general, we're reprinting some of the concerns listed. The list printed here is far from complete.

The suggestions follow: **QUALITY OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE**

Be as it was 15 years ago -- the center of the specific community. Social problems can be handled through elected officials.

Be a patriotic organization. Join to efforts of subversive organizations.

Not more organization, but a greater quality to inspire and set a standard for members.

Have a smaller, more friendly congregation.

One in which "predictability" is a word used for concern and not format.

Help us understand our society, its problems and confusion, its minorities and their aims and how to help in these as average individuals, perhaps in discussion groups.

Help me and others my age (teens) to believe in God. It seems hard sometimes.

Concentrate on the sickness of racism, and provide leadership and education aimed toward eliminating it.

Search ways to bring back respect in our country for God and country by minority groups and some youth.

Offer some program that would require inter-generation involvement.

Help us understand our society, its problems and confusion, its minorities and their aims and how to help in these as average individuals, perhaps in discussion groups.

Help me and others my age (teens) to believe in God. It seems hard sometimes.

View the message of Christ as one for the 70s and not as historic precedent.

Consider the problems of this church and those of Farmington before any other problem in more distant places.

Stop singling out the blacks for special consideration. Let's include all minorities or stop entirely.

It would take strong stands on political and social issues. Its members would be involved in positions of community leadership.

**WORSHIP PROGRAM**

Have Good Friday services for the working people in the downtown area.

Remain open for private worship at all hours (a chapel).

Let us not leave worship service without convincing us that God will take care of us just the coming week.

In Sunday schools -- teach the Bible as it is, to young people especially.

Have a few more of the spiritual symposiums with rock and roll music.

Have services less ritualistic, more informal.

Hold worship experimentation to a minimum -- it tends to be distracting.

Special services appealing to different groups are okay though.

Return to a more spiritual feeling rather than a good lecture.

Allow a person to serve on only one committee at a time, to get more involved.

Try innovative worship services to relate to our young people.

Keep out of all politics! It's the church's duty to encourage people to vote but not to direct influence, or impose will.

Meet the needs of all age groups. In a church to be modern it must not neglect the needs of its older co-titulars.

Use new forms in worship and use them often enough so they become worship, not just a show.

Be open to an unstructured program that would enable people to associate in the community to identify in a positive way with the church.

Have a service some time during the week besides on Sunday.

**ACTION CONCERNS**

More involvement with young people than community clubs and activities.

Give more service to the needy in convalescent homes in our community.

Be a center for the accumulation of information on, and the inspiration for, action on issues which the church should and must face.

Develop a file association-recruitment in community to combat declining moral standards.

Reach out into the surrounding area to meet the needs of people--drift store-day care center.

Have one or more groups studying problems such as poverty, drug abuse, etc. within the Farmington community. Also implement necessary action steps.

Open wider our church door, for community use.

Have a small board of young people (senior high through college) that would listen in on the Board of Trustees and offer their views and suggestions.



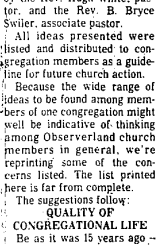
