If there's any bright spot in the whole thing; it is that Manoog is clearly the exception that-makes his case noteworthy. For every cop-who focally drifts over the line, for every cop-who foces something notorious, there are thou-sands who spend a lifetime in obscurity work-ing at tedious jobs that offer few opportunities to feel good about their fellow man and one that falls about, even among themselves. And they do it with dignity, honor and good humor and without ever embarrassing their profession or themselves.
