The report is an analysis of expenses of council members for attending conferences and workshops. Some of those include, for example, conferences apposered by the Michigan Municipal

By far, the greatest expenses were charged at conferences sponsored by the National Leagno of Cities, held in Allanta, Washington and Lies Angeled during the tive-year period.
