The clerk's office must return those fees — which will take a week or two — and collect new ones, Altman said. Those who finish first and second in the Democratic and Republican primaries will have their fees returned. (Minor parties are not involved in the primary and nominate their candidates at conventions.)

UPHOLDING OAKLAND Circuit Judge George LaPlata, the Supreme Court ruled early last week that the Michigan Legislature made an unconstitutional procedural step in 1983 when it redistricted itself.

The ruling reinstated the so-called

"Apoll plan" used in the 1982 election. The Apoll plan contains larger population differences but created geographically more compact districts than the legislature's plan. The ruling delighted many Republicans and dismayed many Democrats.

Unaffected are candidates for U.S. Congress, Oakland County Board of Commissioners, township offices and judicial posts. Their districts were not challenged in the reapportionment suit. Persons who have already filed for (any) county commissioner may not also file for state representative too. Reason: The withdrawal deadline for county commissioner posts has passed. If they attempt to file for both offices, they could be disqualified for both.
