'Rhinestone' teams wacky comedy duo Parton and Stallone

Sylvester Stalione and Dolly Parton together in a film? Ridiculous, right? Wrong! "Ridicutione," co-starring that unlikely couple, is one of the funniest movies around, and whoever thought up the idea deserves a special award.

Dolly plays (what else?) a county singer, Jake Ferris, who is a big hit in front of a tough crowd at the Rinestone, a county-western saloon in New York City.

The problem is that the Ridinestone's techerous owner-manager Freddie Uge, hilariously caricatured by Ron Leibman, bolds a three-year contract on Dolly's services. His electron-citally controlled hachelor pad has everything except girls. Dolly wants her contract and Freddie wants bolly.

The solution is a really big bet. The stakes: Dolly puts up a flow-gran contract extension with extracurricular times in Freddie's pad while Freddie's agrees to surrender her contract and pay all expenses if she can "turn amybody into a country-western singer in two weeks."

THE SEARCH for a candidate is on, and guess what crazy Italian cab driver just happens to pail up? Nick Martinelli (Stallone) has just wrecked his cab and is looking for new opportunities. Reluctantly Nick agrees to the two-week training period, which includes hilarious sequences in his home as well as hers. Papa Martinelli (Steven Apostle Peo) is a very Italian funeral director. Mother Martinelli (Crenty Santon) is thick with tomato sance agano and maternal concern. These stereotypical portraits are warmly drawn, with none of the bilterness that often accompanies ethale film characters.

Pec and Santon's acting and Bob Clark's direction help us laugh with Mother and Father Martinelli, both no set in their ways.

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Similarly, the Ferris family's down-home ways in Tonnessee, where Dolly clacks Siy for his two-week transformation, are warm and pleasant, with no malice and lots of laughs. Her father, Noah (Richard Farnsworth), is pleasant, low-keyed and never loses the understanding twinkle in his eye.

Dolly's exclance and singing partner Barnett Cole (Tim Thomesson) can do no right, but he keeps on trying.

With such an excellent supporting cast, who needs good leads?
