

# Institute of arts shows Faberge collection

"Faberge: The Forbes Magazine Collection" brings 200 masterpieces by Peter Carl Faberge to the Detroit Institute of Arts through Sunday, Aug. 12.

Faberge (1846-1920) headed a firm which became world-renowned for its celebrated Imperial Easter Eggs — prized possessions of the last czars of Russia — as well as for jeweled flowers, fantasias, figure groups, and animals.

This is one of the largest Faberge collections in the world outside of the Russian Kremlin and the Royal Collection in England.

The Detroit loan includes eight of the Imperial eggs, among them the spectacular "Coronation" egg (1897) presented by Czar Nicholas II to his wife, Alexandra, in commemoration of their accession to the Imperial throne.

## Take a 'grand tour'

Nearly 200 prints, drawings and watercolors of European scenes from the permanent collection are on exhibit through July 15 in the Detroit Institute of Arts Schwartz Graphic Arts Gallery.

"Voyages Pittoresques" is a travelogue of landscapes, cityscapes and architectural views that captivated artists through the 16th and the early 20th century.

"Most of the works have in common the absence of color. The artists chose the challenge of evoking a multi-color world within limits imposed by black and white prints," said Marilyn Symmes, associate curator of Graphic Arts, who organized the exhibition.

"This show offers the opportunity to take a Grand Tour, guided by Dürer, Rembrandt, Seymour Chwast, Charles-François Daubigny, Charles Meryon, Mulreuth Bone, Emil Nolde and others and to share their curiosity and delight

five-inch gold egg opens to reveal a tiny reproduction of their coronation coach, complete in every detail — rock crystal windows, platinum tires and diamond-set gold trellis work.

Others in the exhibition are the "First Imperial Egg" of 1894, the 1890 "Spring Flowers" egg, the 1894 "Re-

naissance" egg, the 1903 "Chanticleer" egg and the "15th Anniversary" and "Orange Tree" eggs of 1911.

The Art Institute showing will be the public debut of several recent additions to the collection, including a splendid silver motor car and a monumental folkloric desk furniture, according to Christopher Forbes, vice president — associate publisher, who joined Forbes Magazine in 1970 as curator of the company art collection.

His father, Malcolm S. Forbes, chairman and editor-in-chief of Forbes Magazine, began the Faberge collection in the mid-1960s.

The Faberge objects will be discussed in "Masterwork of the Week," talks at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday and Friday, July 25 and 27, by Bonnie LaMarche, research assistant in the Department of European Sculpture and Decorative Arts.

If your income for 1983 did not exceed \$10,000.00 and you are a paraplegic, quadriplegic, senior citizen, eligible serviceman, eligible veteran, with the City of Farmington Hills Treasurer's Office no later than September 15, 1984. Summer taxes that are deferred will be payable along with winter taxes no later than Tuesday, February 15, 1985.

By law, PAYMENTS BY MAIL are recorded by the Treasurer on the date actually received. Payments received after August 31, 1984, will be returned with added penalty.

### CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 25, 1984

Mayor Williams opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on June 25, 1984 at 7:30 p.m. Members present, Anzlov, Dolan, Dudley, Soronen, Williams and Wolf. Absent: Alkatech. Others present: City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns, Assistant City Manager Costick and City Attorney Ilbeau.

The agenda was approved with the following changes: item 11.d. (Reports on separation of school and City tax bill) was postponed until the July 9, 1984 meeting; and item 10.c. (Consideration of Executive Session to discuss property acquisition) was added to the agenda.

The Minutes of June 4, 1984 were approved as amended and the Minutes of June 11, 1984 were approved as published.

Resolution No. 3, No. 4, and No. 4 for the Hathaway Street road improvements in Section 19 were adopted and the date of July 16, 1984 was set for the cost hearing.

Council denied the request for water improvements for Eight Mile/Metrowest/Goldsmith in Section 32.

Resolution No. 3, No. 4, and No. 6 for the Lundy Street road improvements in Section 34 were adopted and the date of July 16, 1984 was set for the cost hearing.

Resolution No. 5 for the cost hearing for Salem water improvement in Section 12 was adopted.

Resolution No. 1 for the cost hearing for Scottsdale Road resurfacing in Section 1 was adopted.

Zoning Map Amendment No. C82-333 (ZR 19-3-84) was enacted to rezone land located at 2364 Orchard Lake Road, between Burbank and Barlow in Section 11, from RA-1 to OS-2.

Zoning Map Amendment No. C82-333 (ZR 19-3-84) was enacted to rezone lots 117 and 118 of Regal Orchards Subdivision in Section 33 from RA-4 to OS-1.

Zoning Map Amendment No. C82-334 (ZR 20-3-84) was enacted to rezone lot 20 of Oakland Hills Orchard Subdivision in Section 11 from RA-2 to OS-2.

Zoning Map Amendment No. C82-334 (ZR PC 20-3-84) was enacted to rezone lot 18 of Oakland Hills Orchard Subdivision in Section 11 from RA-2 to OS-2.

Zoning Map Amendment No. C82-334 (ZR 21-3-84) was enacted to rezone lots 12 and 13 from RA-4 to B-3, lots 14 through 18 from RA-4 to P-1, and lots 19 through 23 from RA-4 to OS-1, all lots located in Farmington Heights Subdivision in Section 2.

Ordinance No. C14-64 was enacted regarding tax exemption for the Finniest Center Association's housing project for the elderly and the summary was approved for publication.

E.D.C. Resolutions No. 1 and No. 2 for the Carrefour - Mulwood Office Project were denied.

The date of July 16, 1984 was set for the public hearing on the vacation of Moran Street right-of-way in Section 28.

The Site Plan was approved for Crosswinds of Country Ridge, Part of PRD plan in Section 6.

The Site Plan and Open Space Plan were approved for Country Ridge Multiples (PRD) in Section 6.

Council determined to hold an Executive Session immediately following tonight's meeting to discuss property acquisition.

Traffic Control Order No. SL-49-1984 was adopted for the establishment of 23 mph speed limit for Colfax Road for east and westbound traffic between Farmington Road and Oak Road.

Traffic Control No. Y-216-1984 was adopted requiring that all northbound Lyncroft Road yield for all Quaker Valley Road traffic.

Traffic Control Order No. ST-123-1984 was adopted requiring that all southbound Hemlock Road traffic yield to stop for all Quaker Valley Road traffic.

Traffic Control Order No. Y-247-1984 was adopted requiring that all northbound Quaker Valley Lane traffic yield for Quaker Valley Road traffic.

The contract for the 1984/85 Concrete Replacement Program was extended to cover the 1984/85 Concrete Replacement Program with the 4" and 8" concrete replacement being reduced by the amount of \$1.00 per unit cost, resulting in a unit cost of \$18.00 per square yard and \$22.00 per square yard, respectively. The total cost of the 1984/85 project not to exceed the budgeted amount of \$96,000.00.

Council approved a two-year contract for City Manager William Costick, effective July 1, 1984.
