## Labels Tell The Story On Kid's Clothes

Smooth plain seams/linings, interfacings, and reinforcement at points of strain are signs of quality in children's clothes, says Bernice J. Tharp, extuesion clothing specialist of the Pennsylvania State University. Not all children's clothing, however, have all these good features. A garment can still be a good buy if the fabric, style, and fit are what you want for the price you want to pay.

You can usually finish scams, change buttons, or reinforce weak spots at home to improve the appearance and wearing quality of the garments.

READING LABELS Is one of the best ways to know what you're getting for your money, remnings Miss Tharp. A label can tell you what filters have been used in the garment and how much of each filter. This is given in percentages.

For example, a garment may labeled "90 per cent cotton, 50 per cent Dacron polyester."

It's a good idea to saw the label or tag and write the name of the garment on it. If you file tags or labels in a box, according to the type of garmet, you'll have them ready for quick reference, Miss Tharp adds.

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
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
