4-H Clubs Work Learn Work, Learn

In the process of "learning by doing" 4-H youths and their parents are involved in a number of projects including a field crops science project and a horse program.

The project, which is sponsored by Amchem Products, Inc. of Ambler, Pa., involves soil testing, planting, and weed and insect control. Members working on the project learn how to make things grow where they did not grow before.

They experiment with seed germination, the effect of weather and light on plant growth and the different types of soil.

Annual incentive awards are presented at the county, state and national level. This year's awards consist of four medals per county and a certificate of honor for the state winner.

Enrollment in the 4-H horse program has jumped 600 per cent in the last 10 years. In it members learn how to ride, train, show and take care of horses through the program.

Four scholarships are awarded annually to the highest ranking individuals from the four geographical sections of the U.S.



Help Swat Out Flies

Flies are becoming nuisance around the home, and the battle will continue into September.

Steve Moore, University of Illinois and natural history survey entomologist, offers these suggestions to help reduce the fly problem around your home.

Be sure that garbage and other refuse are removed at least once a week. Spray refuse containers—inside and out—and the area around refuse containers with malathion. Use three ounces of 50 to 57% of malathion emulsion concentrate in one gallon of water.

To control flies inside the home, Moore says to keep screens in good repair and hang plastic resin strips containing 20% dichlorvos (DDVP) in one strip per 1000 cubic feet of space or about one per room. The strips will kill flies for four to six weeks.

Don't use the strips in kitchens or other areas where food is handled. And don't use them in rooms where infants, the ill, or aged persons are confined. Before using a spray or solution, check the labels for any restrictions.

Moore says a 0.1% or stronger pyrethrum space spray, applied from a pressurized spray can, can be used for quick knockdown in place of the dichlorvos resin strips. Repeat treatments will be needed with the space spray.

For emergencies keep a fly swatter handy.
