Tanner Paintings Shown At Institute

Rediscovery of Henry O. Tanner, a major American Negro artist who enjoyed in-ternational fame at the turn of the century, is celebrated in a major showing of his drawings and paintings at the Detroit Institute of Arts this summer.

The exhibition features some 58 oils, watercolors, drawings and etchings by Tunner and also a portrait of Tanner painted by his teacher, the famous Thomas Eakins. It is open to the public without charge and remains through Sunday, Aug. 23.

The show was organized by the Frederick Douglass Institute. Wahington, D.C., in collaboration with the National Collection of Fine Arts, and is traveling under the auspices of the Smithsonian Institution.

Berhaps America's most important Negro artist. Henry Tonner was the first Africamerican to be admitted to the National Academy of Design in the United States. In France, he was awarded the Legion of Honor and became world famous when his cart-vas. "The Raising of Lazar-us." won a gold medal in the Paris Sulon of 1997.

Tanner won many other top prizes in Europe and the United States. His paintings were sought by museums and collectors until Interest declined under the impact of modern art during the last decades of his life. He lived from 1859 to 1937.

Remaining aloof from the Remaining aloas from in-abstract movement and post-impressionism, he developed a highly-personalized. often romantic style. Blue-green tones and the use of heavy glazes are notable features of his work.

Carroll Greene Jr., curator of the Afro-American Collection of the Frederick Douglass Institute and co-organizer of the exhibition, points out.

"Tanner earned his reputation in France as an outstanding artist without any racial con-siderations. But this exhibition when our society is attempting to rid itself of a 'conspiracy of silence' which has surrounded the contributions of Afro Americans."

A DISTINGUISHED specialist, Greene will lecture on "The Art of Henry O. Tanner" at the Detroit Institute of Arts Tuesday, July 21, at 8 p.m. This event, too, is open to the public without charge and is co-sponsered by the Education Department and African Art Gallery Committee of the Founders Society.

Michigan artists and craftsmen will present an exhibit at Northland Shopping Center from July 30 until Aug. 15.


