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Park Purchase In Oakland OK'd By DNR

The department's option to buy the large tract, strategically located five miles from Flint and 2 1/2 miles from Pontiac. The Commission voted to make June 30 the effective date of the approval to provide time before the option cut-off to seek federal funds to cost share purchase of the 1,187 acres.

The DNR's request for a grant of federal Open Space funds to help finance the purchase is now before officials of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). DNR leaders hope to draw those funds up to the limit allowed by HUD, perhaps covering 50 percent of \$2,200,000 purchase figures.

Under HUD policy, Open Space monies are made available only for projects which are still pending state approval, again explaining the Commission's decision to make its action effective on the last day of the purchase option.

Actual purchase of the Seven Lakes State Park tract is also subject to legislative action on Senate Bill 1555, which some of the first lands from the \$100 million recreation bond program have been lined up to buy these lands. The bill directs the

Department of Natural Resources.

Approval of the purchase, keyed to the DNR's stepped-up efforts of expanding recreational outlets near southern Michigan's population centers, is effective June 30, 1970.

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DNR, as it has done, to seek federal funds to cost share acquisition of this new project.

The line item request in S.B. 1555 for bond purchase funds is part of the appropriation sought by the DNR for the 1969-70 fiscal year.

The 1,187 acres scheduled for acquisition feature more than 3 miles of lake frontage backed by gently rolling hills and wooded slopes which give the tract premium potential for recreational development to serve large numbers of people.

Glenn C. Gregg, the DNR's deputy director of recreation, told the commission that this proposed purchase tract could have sold for an estimated \$15 million if it had come under real estate development.

He added that acquisition of that tract, coupled with 175 acres purchased in the area last year, will set the stage for early development of the new state park site.

The park, most of which now will be state-owned, is bounded by Grange Hall Road on the south, Tinsman Road on the north, Fish Lake Road on the east, and Eddy Lake Road on the west.

The agreed-upon purchase figure for the 1,187 acres was reached after the DNR made its own appraisal of the lands and hired 3 private firms to conduct separate appraisals to make extra sure the "price was right."

The DNR's own appraisal figure was substantiated by those of the outside firms.

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
