Nearly 200 prints, drawings and watercolors of European scenes from the permanent collection are on exhibit through July 15 in the Detroit Institute of Arts Schwartz Graphic Arts Galler-ies. "Voyages Pittoresques" is a travel-ogue of landscapes, cityscapes and ar-chitectural views that capitvated art-ists between the 16th and the early 20th century.

"Landscape with a View toward Haar-lem", commonly known as "The Goldweigher's Field". A wide expanse of typically Dutch lowland fields stretches to a flat horizon line, inter-

stretues to a flat borton line, interrupted only by distant church ateeples.
The Junction of the Severn and the
Wye (views in England), depicted in
James M. W. Turner's 1811 print, is
considered one of England's most pleturesque natural sights.
Collaborative printmaking is exempillified in chiaroscuro mezzulints by
David Lucas (1802-1881) recreating
John Constable's painterly atmospheric
effects with dramatic tones of luminous whites, shades of gray and velvety
black in "Castle Acre Priory" and
views of "Sallsbury Cathedral".

Francis Seymour Haden, foremost British printmaker of the mid-19th cen-tury, is represented by "A Sunset in Ire-land" while across the Channel artists like Daublgon were depleting screene forest retreats in the vicinity of Barbi-

zon.

Paris enticed the greatest French
etchers, including Charles Meryon who
precisely delineated views of the buildings near Notre Dame Cathedral.

CULOH emerges in two 19th century French drawings — a realistic pastel of rocky cliffs on the Normandy coast by Charles-Francois Eustache, and a watercolor of Kew Gardens, executed by Camille Plaarro during a 1892 trip to London.
