Sobriety discussed

A videotaped lecture by Dr. Russell Smith, "Quality Sobriety," will be featured at Brighton Hospital's next community education program at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 7.

Smith, Brighton Hospital's Medical Director, frequently lectures at professional and community forums on alcoholism and substance abuse. The taped presentation is from the series he conducts during the hospital's patient education program.

In his lecture Smith discusses the pitfalls and hurdles a recovering alcoholic must deal with to maintain sobriety after receiving treatment for the disease. Following the film, a trained counselor will be available to answer ques-

tions and explain what help is available for both the alcoholic and family.

The informal style of the free community education program allows people who are concerned about a loved one's drinking to obtain information about the disease of alcoholism and its treatment.
