STEFANAC CLAIMS, in the com-plaint, that she prepared a report showing explicit sex discrimination practices, but that she was ordered to

practices, but that she was ordered to destroy the report.

The suit alleges that color-coded bagels were marked on applications of Jewish applicants to "secretly discriminate" against those potential students. Stefanac was unavailable for comment. Her attorney Edward Bell said she was also ordered to destroy any avidence of coding the applicants 'files. Another allegation was that certain

staff positions at the 1,400-student in-stitution were to be filled by males and others by females. Cranbrook includes the coed Brookside School (P-3), Cran-brook School for boys (6-12) and Kings-wood School for girls (6-12).



Several gravel shelters in the Farm-ington area were washed out by the heavy rains, but workers were repair-ing them on Thursday, Karovak said.




