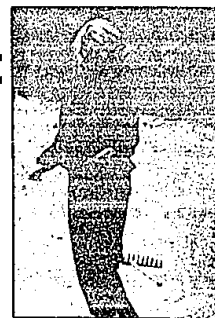
works with everything.

Patty Letzer wears Carol Stormz' three-piece skirt, long sleeve shirt and oversize vest, \$172, from Leolards, Etc.

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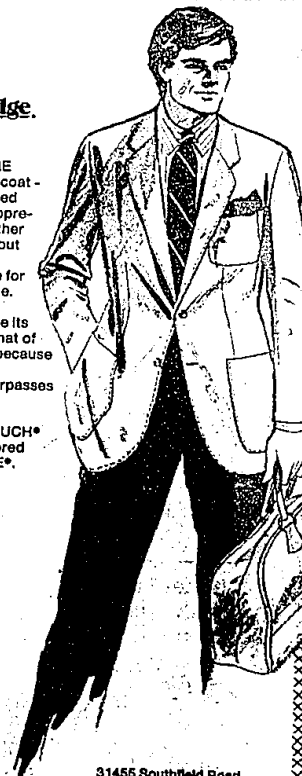
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
