## Cruce maps way for Michigan delegation

DALLAS — "Do you know the way to the Anatole?" asked the woman dele-gate who wanted to attend the rally at vice President George Bush's head-

Vice President George Bush's head-uniter bid.

"Yes, I do. I'll give you a map," re-plied the Michigan delegation's trans-portation director — better known as state Sen. Doug Cruce of Troy.

The lean, tanned, 36-year-old-lawmaker quickly has become an ex-pert on the hetwork of highways, roads and hotels in America's seventh largest metropolis, which this week is hosting the Republican National Convention.

"I thought it would be a breeze," said Cruce, whing his brow in the 107-de-gree heat.

Assisting him were five college stu-dents from Michigan and Texas.
'He just volunteered,' said GOP State Chaffrana Spencer Abraham. 'He wanted to do something.'
'He personally met the majority of planes, and he personally drove a bus,' said an admirting Jane Hersbey, one of two Michigan GOP staff workers.

SEVERAL OTHER legislators are delegates, but Cruce didn't want to come to Dallas that way.

"As an elected person, I don't want to compete with party workers for delegate positions," Cruce said. He also admitted to being more interested in the 1988 convention, which will pick new party leaders and be more than a Reagan coronation.

Early in the year be volunteered his services to Abraham. Two main jobs services to Abraham. Two main jobs were open housing, with National Committeewoman Margaret (Ranny) Rucker spoke for, and transportation, which Cruce thought would be "a breeze."

"Originally," he said, "Everyone was supposed to be going on American Airlines (designated the official airlines of the convention). That would have meant everyone would be coming on

"So American began running its own specials, and we had a lot of changes and cancellations back again the last

and cancellations back again the last two weeks.

"I lined up large buses with the Dal-last Transit Service, but then we had to rent accouple of vans, too.
"Jason Allen (college student from Traverse City) and Jon Underwood (college student from Warren) called and wanted to do volunteer work," he

said.

Cruce also heard of a college professor in Texas who had lined up student interns. Cruce landed a couple. "They knew the lay of the land," he said.

A MAJOR problem came when I1 delegates flying from Grand Rapids were detained by thunderstorms. They missed their connecting flight at Chicago and had to make other arrangements.

Cruce stood walting for them in vain at the Dailas-Ft. Worth airport. "We didn't know what happened to them until they started showing up on other flights," he said. "We finally found all

but two."

Checking his schedule, Cruce found
that fellow state Sen. Nick Smith of
Hillsdale County was to arrive on a
non-existent flight. "I didn't know anything about it until Doug called my office a couple of days before," Smith
said.

said.

The mixup was caused by the fact that Smith's flight was to arrive in Houston, not Dalias-Ft. Worth. Smith eventually made it to Dalias in time for the first caucus.

After U.S. Sen nominee Jack Lousan gave a pep talk, Cruce found himself addressing the Michigan caucus,
not on convention strategy but on what
passes were good for what shuttlebuses.

Air-conditioned chartered buses took
the delegation from the Marriotit
Quorum Hotel to the convention parkting lot, four blocks from the Convention Center.

Cruce's strong advice: "It's a bot
with the convention center it walk it. Take the

shuttlebus "As each delegate, alternate, reporter
and guest boarded the bus at the hotel,
Cruce told each one, "Enemember, this
is bus No. 12. It's the only one coming
back to the Quorum. Remember, take
only bus 12.


