let of responsibility. We have over 300 members to tend to. Pres does a great job."

Muir has been working under Melsel the past six years.

Twenty-six years ago, the job of a golf pro was strictly to teach members the game of golf. Now, a golf pro has to run tournaments, represent the club by playing in tournaments, and maintain a pro shop (the pro shops of today resemble a sporting goods store), as well as teaching.

Still, Melsel refuses to call what he does "work."

"THERE ARE no tiresome aspects of being a golf pro," he said with a grin. "It's all fun."

Melsel, though he only gets to play once a week, still shoots his age, 70, frequently. Two plaques are mounted on his office wall — they commemorate his two biggest golfing accomplishments. He and partner Jack Seltzer won the Michigan Senior Junior

Golf Championships in 1978 and in 1981.

"I'll tell you about Pres," said Martin, who has known Melsel about as long as anyone — except his wife, "he's a hell of a nice guy. A gentleman. And he's a great instructor. A lot of good golfers have come out of this club."

Many excellent women golfers have been tutored by Melsel. In fact, Melsel initiated, and funded from his own pocket, the Preston Melsel Match Play Tournament for the club's women players.

What will Melsel do after he retires? "Ah, nobody cares what I'm going to do after I retire," he said with mock disgust.

What he will do is pursue his real love — fishing. "Golf is business, fishing is my hobby," he said.

Said Martin: "Yeah, we're going to miss Pres. You won't get anyone to ever say a bad word about him. Of course, how can you say something bad about a guy who doesn't say anything?" Good point.

Mayor Williams opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on September 10, 1984 at 7:30 P.M. Members present: Aldateeb, Amulov, Dolan, Dudley, Williams and Wolf. Absent: Bortone. Others present: City Manager Cordick, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Elbert.

Minutes of August 20 and 27, 1984 were approved as amended.

Council adopted revised assessment roll, Resolution No. 5, for repaving of Chatsworth Road in Section 1.

Council approved Project Plan, EDC Standard Resolution No. 4, for Neyer, Tisco and Hinds, Ltd. Project, located on Hills Tech Drive in Section 18.

Council approved Project Plan, EDC Standard Resolution No. 4, for H & J Industrial Center Project, located on Haledon Road in Section 18.

Council approved Project Plan, EDC Standard Resolution No. 4, for Greater Detroit Ologie Group Project, located on Middlebelt Road in Section 14.

Public Hearing for Resolution No. 4 for Project Plan for Orchard Place Development and 32nd and 33rd Avenues was held on September 24, 1984.

Consideration of 12 month Repeat Class C license with Dance Permit, located at 32205 Grand River for Paul Capraro was withdrawn from agenda.

Council waived license fee for George and Georgette Kashi for transfer of Resort C and 33rd Avenues with Dance/Entertainment Permit for 1984.

Council set date for Public Hearing for Vacation of north one-half of Valley Road in Section 12 for October 23, 1984.

Council introduced Amendment to Solicitors Ordinance No. C-18-84, Chapter 81, Section 81.170.

Consideration of adopting policy for including legislative history for new ordinances was withdrawn from agenda.

Council confirmed the following reappointments of the Mayor to the Farmington Hills Commission on Aging: James McDonald, Kathleen Nylis and Aldo Vagstad.

Also reappointed to Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Commission is Mary Furan and Dan Sheehan appointed to Cable Access Committee.

Council determined to hold an executive session immediately following the regular meeting to discuss pending litigation.

Decision on extension of application date for Bridle Hills Open Space was adjourned and referred to administration for a report.

Council accepted an Irrevocable Bank Letter of Credit and Extension of Escrow Accounts for Improvements to Farmington Green North No. 3 Subdivision, Section 8.

Vacation of portions of Moran Street in Section 38 was approved. (Vacation 4-1984)

Council approved Final Preliminary Plat of Arbor Farms in Section 18.

Agreement with Michigan Department of Transportation and Oakland County Road Commission for resurfacing of Farmington Road from 149th to Thirteenth Mile Road was approved.

Council approved the City's participation with the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County.

The bid for Chatsworth Road Rehabilitation, RAD C-187, was awarded to Reno Mills-Dryll & Sons in the amount of \$19,494.58.

Council tabled consideration of purchase order for procurement of janitorial services.

Resolution was adopted authorizing State Fire Marshall to inspect nursing homes and hospitals in the city.

Council approved an agreement with Michigan Department of Transportation, Oakland County Road Commission and City of Farmington for resurfacing of Orchard Lake Road from Freeway Road to Grand River.

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:02 p.m. on September 4, 1984, by Mayor Pro-Tem Hartcock in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Bennett, Hartcock, Tupper, Walker
 ABSENT: Mayor Yoder

OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Deputy Director Lauboff, City Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Busby.

Minutes of previous meetings were approved.

Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council denied the request of Alan and Priscilla Toth to operate the Fresh Catch Express at 23225 Farmington Road.

Council tabled the request for fence variance at 23235 Floral until the next regularly scheduled meeting.

Council granted permission for the Birchwood Street annual Block Party for September 16, 1984.

Council tabled the appointment to the citizens' advisory committee of the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Commission until next meeting.

Council confirmed the appointment of Frank J. Lauboff as Director of Public Safety.

Council appropriated \$1,250.00 to the Farmington Community Library for driveway improvement.

Council authorized the City Manager to execute the Cooperative Agreement to participate in the Oakland County Community Development Program.

Council authorized the City Manager to enter into a contract for the widening and resurfacing of the Freedom Road/Orchard Lake Road intersection.

Council approved payment of \$5,627.48 to the Gleason Company for repair of the City Hall overhang.

Council established a special work session for October 10, 1984, at 7:00 p.m. Public Comments were heard.

Mr. O. Herbert Henry was reappointed to the Farmington Area Arts Commission.

Council was advised that the Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission will hold a Public Hearing on Franchise Amendments and proposed rate increase on September 11, 1984, at 7:30 p.m.

The following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-18-84

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDERS

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

That the Traffic Control Orders issued by the Chief of Police of the City of Farmington and dated February 4, 1978, are hereby amended as follows: CHAPTER 1

"Regulations Prohibiting Parking at Any Time," Section 1.7, as provided for in Section 2.53 of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages.

CHAPTER 1 - REGULATIONS PROHIBITING PARKING

AT ANY TIME

Section 1.7 - Oakland Street

DELETE from Subsection (c):

"South side of Oakland, west from Grand River to Cass."

ADD THE FOLLOWING:

(d) South side of Oakland Street 115 feet west from Grand River.

This ordinance was introduced at a Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council on August 20, 1984, was adopted and enacted at the next Regular Meeting on September 4, 1984, and will become effective the (10) days after publication.
