Lookout begins for 'winter birds'

Summer's end has started me thinking about some of the many species of birds I have not seen ince inst winter. Scassoal visitors like the tree sparrow with its red cap and prominent "tie tack" or breast spot will be coming soon.

Tree sparrows are very common species in this area, according to surveys done by the Audahon Society during the Christmas season. Every year since 1945 the Derbot Audhon Society also comied all the birds in a 15-mile diameter circle over an eight-hour period.

During the past 39 years 118 different species of birds have been identified, but the Tree Sparrow has been the most common hird counied, pent to the ever present house sparrow and starling.




