The Italian cineaste has lashlored his share of highly pretentious, overly wrought films, especially in the last 15 years. "La Dolce Vita" is one of his earlier works, though, and a shining example of the innovative and daring novic making for which Fellius's most remembered. Marcello Mastrolani stars as a troubled press agent who Inds Ilite along Rome's glamorous Via Veneto both decadent and intoxicating. As Mastrolani searches for his own identity while fluctuating between real and imagined worlds, the illiestives of Italy's "beautiful people" are ingeniously, and sometimes bumorously, exposed.
