Safety officers renew contract with the city

A new 12.25-percent salary increase for Farmington Public Safety officers will cost the city an additional \$85,000 in personnel costs over the pext three

Negotiations between the city and the 16-member Public Safety Officers Association resulted in the new three-Association resulted in the new three-year contract retractive to July 1, 1884 through Jane 30, 1897. Farming-ton city council members approved the new contract at their meeting last Mooday night. Effective January 1, 1985, the agree-

ment calls for a 4-percent increase the first year, raising the salary of public salety officers from \$23,717 to \$27,704 The salary for an officer temporarily taking the place of a shift commander (classified as a public safety officer 1), will increase from \$27,587 to \$28,690 the first year.

Trial date set for fire chief By Joanno Mallazewski and the charge against Karon

Former Farmington Hills Fire Chief Lawrence Karon will stand trial next month on a charge of emberzlement of \$100 or less, a misdemeanor.

The jury trial is scheduled before 47th District Judge Margaret Schaeffer at 9 s.m. Oct. 24. At bia straignment in August, Karon stood mute on the charge. A plea of not guilty was en-tered for him.

A police investigation into a break-in at a Farmington Hills fire station led to Karon's arrest in August.

The misdemeanor carries a penalty of 90 days in jail, a \$100 fine or both upon conviction.

While police were investigating the firebouse burglary during which \$120-\$130 was taken, other information con-cerning noother amount of cash which was not accounted for surfaced, ac-cording to Police Chief John Nichols in August.

The investigation into the firehouse break-in is continuing, said Sgt. John Kohls. But police have no suspects or new leads, he said.

At the time of Karon's arrest in Aug-ust, Nichols said that there was no con-pection between the firehouse break-in
