

Ex-Hawk Lemanski is frat's Athlete of Year

Greg Lemanski played his last collegiate football game 16 months ago. He graduated from Albion College nearly five months ago.

But the honors keep rolling in for the Farmington native.

The latest was conferred upon him last month by his fraternity, Sigma Nu. Lemanski was named Athlete of the Year at Sigma Nu's Grand Chapter (biennial convention), held in Kansas City, Mo.

He was also one of six fraternity members inducted into the Alpha Alpha Affiliates Chapter, which recognizes outstanding seniors.

LEMANSKI SERVED as co-captain of Albion's football team last season. The middle guard earned the team's Most Valuable Player award and was

named to the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) first team. He was awarded MIAA Defensive Player of the Week honors for his performance against Wabash College. Lemanski also served as co-captain of the Michigan Lacrosse Club.

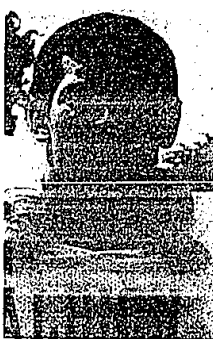
The award acknowledges athletes who demonstrate "qualities of athletic skill, determination and sportsmanship" and "establish a pattern of performance for others to follow."

Zeno lifts North to upset of Glenn

Cross country can be, at times, a very predictable sport. On Thursday, for example, North Farmington coach Mark Bechard knew if Westland John Glenn's girls ran 1-2-3, they would win. That's what was expected to happen.

But — surprise — that didn't happen. North Farmington's girls cross country team, led by Barb Zeno's first-place finish, upset host John Glenn in a Northwest Suburban League (NSL) opener, 27-31.

"The girls ran a real good race," Bechard said.

Zeno, clocked in 20:50, broke up Glenn's 1-2-3 punch of Karen Opp (20:56), Pam Eldridge (21:17) and Laura Granville (21:17).

North, 6-0 in duals, garnered the next four places (6-8): Carolyn Alkon, 22:24; Suzanne Hamblin, 22:35; Donna Chuba, 22:42; and Kathy Koteras, 23:41.

In the boys meet, North's Kirk Armstrong finished first in 16:49, but the Raiders fell in the team scoring, 20-42.

Glenn took the next six places led by Jim Tolodaj, 17:04; Jay Hunt, 17:25; Tod Lilla, 17:32; Dan Liedel, 17:54; Frank Shelly, 18:14; and Kyle Sukalski, 18:16. North's Mike Bendon was eighth.

FARMINGTON, (the No. 2-ranked boys team in Oberlinland), kept rolling along, besting Walpole Central, 23-32 Thursday at Oakland Community College.

The win was the fifth straight for the unbeaten Falcons.

Al Stebbias (17:09), Bruce Kratt (17:31) and Bryan Lawton (17:44) went 1-2-3 for the Falcons. John Pich (18:30) and Ken Duneback (18:35) placed eighth and ninth.

The meet allowed Farmington coach Jerry Young to play Sparky Anderson. With a busy schedule in process, Young rested Chris Inch, Bruce Kerr and Dave Duneback, three of his top runners.

The Falcons girls team also emerged victorious Thursday, taking a 26-34 decision from Central. Nicole Jolley (21:33) took second, Anna Quenneville (22:41) fifth, Diana Wickham (23:07) sixth, Amy Barber (23:47) ninth and Jamie Miller (23:03) 10th for Farmington.

The girls are 2-4 on the season. LIVONIA STEVENSON swept both the boys and the girls meets Thursday against Farmington Harrison at Cass Benton Park.

In a 24-31 boys victory, Jack Taglian and Mike Newton placed first and second for the Spartans with times of 17:53 and 18:02, respectively. Harrison garnered the next three spots with Dave Linn, third, 18:07; Chris Hart, fourth, 18:21; and Mike Eaker, fifth, 18:25. Then came Mike Duffy, Stevenson, 18:26; Greg Durbin, Stevenson, 18:29; Kevin Kerr, Stevenson, 18:48; Craig Moritz, Harrison, 18:51; and Tom Blason, Harrison, 18:54.

Sur Taglian led Stevenson to an easy girls win with a first place clocking of 22:35. Teammate Michele Economus was second (22:47) and Harrison's Jenny Anderson was third (23:30).

Plymouth Salem's girls basketball team improved its record to 4-1 with a 52-30 rout over Farmington Harrison Thursday.

The loss was Harrison's 27th in a row.
