The Childbirth Preparation Association will begin a six-week class in the psychoprophylactic (Lamaze) method of childbirth on Aug. 13 at the First United Methodist Church of Wayne.

Registered nurses instruct the classes which meet one night a week. Women are advised to begin the classes at least eight weeks before their due dates.

The class will give an ex-

planation of labor and birth, and instructions in neuromuscular control and effective breathing techniques which will enable the mother to be awake, aware and participating in the birth of her child.

Husbands are urged to attend the class with their wives.

## Women on the Go

### Mary And Politics Seem To Go Together

Whether working for herself or another candidate, Mary Dumas of Livonia is happy when politicking.

This dark-haired mother of three, defeated in her second bid for a seat on the Livonia city council this spring, has turned her attention to managing Lenore Romney's senatorial nomination campaign in this area.

"And I like it both ways," she says. "I guess it's more satisfying, working for yourself, but there's more heart-break that way, too. You think you develop a pretty thick skin when you go into politics, but you still can feel the hurt deeply."

**MRS. DUMAS** a Detroit native, got an early start in politics. Her mother was a board member for the Wayne County Republican Club.

"My birthday is Feb. 12, and I used to spend it alone because my parents were at Lincoln Day dinners," she remembers. "Now I go to the Lincoln Day dinners."

Her attendance there and political involvement generally has the endorsement of her family. Husband Victor, president of the advertising firm Art-Industrial; daughter Cordelia, a soon-to-be bride; son Charles, serving at Great

Lakes with the U.S. Navy, and Julianne, who will be at Stevens High School in the fall.

"Things may get a little hairy sometimes, but they all normally push me into things like running for city council and working for Lenore," she said. "And I don't need much pushing."

**MARY WENT** the Girl Scout-Boy Scout-PTA-Sunday School teacher route until Michigan's Constitution Convention and George Romney's first campaign. She worked on GOP campaigns first in Dearborn Heights before moving to Livonia.

With the 15th District Republicans, she has served as vice chairman of the district committee, secretary of the 19th-Wayne operational committee and a coordinator for seven projects. She also has been a precinct delegate and area coordinator and by-laws chairman for the Michigan Federation of Republican Women and charter president of the Livonia Women's Federation.

Her community service illustrates her contention that

"women spend time researching issues; they know their facts and don't talk off the top of the head."

She's been Livonia chairman of the Women's Action Against Crime Committee that established a full time court observing program, secretary of the Livonia Charter Revisions Committee and chairman of the Support Our Court Board Drive Committee.

She also has headed the Livonia School Board Advisory Committee and was co-chairman of the Livonia Conference on Fiscal Reform for Quality Education and is a member of the city's Drug Abuse Committee and the League of Women Voters.

**IN HER WORK** on behalf of Mrs. Romney, Mary has been in charge of setting up precinct organizations and heading several appearances the candidate has made in the area, including a tea at the Livonia Family Y that drew more than 200 women last week.

"I think the team generated a lot of enthusiasm," she said. "People are interested in seeing women in office."

"If I were not for a couple of family circumstances, Mary thinks she just might be making a run for the state House of Representatives and campaigning alongside Mrs. Romney instead of working for her."

Daughter Cordelia, known to the family as Dee Ann, is being married Aug. 14 to James Caslow, and weddings are being planned for the two candidates just don't go together, her mother thinks.

Thirteen-year-old Julie will be in her first year of high school, so Mary felt she should not commit herself to the commuting to Lansing she'd have to do if elected.

But there's certainly another political campaign in Mary Dumas' future, and this University of Wisconsin graduate also is interested in going back to school to get a master of arts in political science or maybe even a law degree.

**TWO COMMON** sayings never fail to rub Mary the wrong way.

"I resent the term 'dirty politics' and I can't understand why some people say they don't want to discuss politics or religion with friends," she said.

"Whatever cleaning politics needs can be done only when more people get involved and take responsibility. And as for discussions - I'd certainly rather talk about politics than dishwashers or cars!"

## Home Ec Teachers Attend Workshop

Between the high cost of the obstetrician and the high cost of the mortician stretches the vast expanse of the high cost of living.

The tells for this common thoroughfare were the subject of intensive study at the Home Economics Workshop for in-service teachers which was held at Mercy College of Detroit. It was directed by Sister Mary Celeste Schneider, Mercy College, and Sister Cecile Therese Beresford, Fontbonne College, St. Louis, Mo.

Here home economics teachers from the Detroit area and out-state Michigan met to study ways of broadening their offerings in home economics and of focusing their courses directly on a homemaking plan for the 70's and the "new" consumer, the young person just taking on economic responsibility for their own support or the support of their family.

Included in the workshop

were demonstrations of new methods and evaluation procedures to be used in teaching consumer education and management as well as in the related fields of a comprehensive home economics program such as housing, family living and child development, and family health.

The participants in the conference worked to develop pertinent instructional materials using the Mercy College learning resource center. A special focus of the conference was the role of the professional home economist working in an economically deprived area.

The goal of each workshop participant was to apply the concepts discussed in the sessions to her own particular teaching situation and to develop instructional materials and resources which would specifically meet the needs of her students.
