"I never heard of a bike moving a bus, I never heard of a borse moving a bus, though it might be possible," said Pollack, a former community college instructor, her mouth tight in mock seriousness.

IT WAS OPEN season in the Michigan Senate on lawyers and their legal language as the upper chamber debated a bill on bus operators' liability insurance. And senators who are former educators were having the most fun with the legal jarcon.

"This speaks to 'transportation to or from a point,' "chimed in Sen. Jack Faxon, D.Farmington Hills, a private school headmaster. "Transportation is moving people, by definition. To or from a point,' is redundant."

Here is the exact language of the bill which amused them:

amused them:

"A bus operated by a canoe or other watercraft,
leyele, or horse livery used only to transport passengers to or from a destination point" is exempt
from requirements for personal protection liability insurance.

ACTUALLY, THE bill applies to buses operated y liveries which rent out canoes, bicycles or orses — not to buses operated by canoes, bicy-les or horse.

cies or horses.

Once the language question was cleared up, at the expense of the lawyers' dignity, amused senators sent the bill on for third reading.

"Third reading"? That's legislators' talk for placing the bill on the calendar for final passage next time.
