Hawks settle old debt by trouncing Churchill

Just when you think he's played as well as a high school football player can play, he goes one notch better.

The Farmington Harrison senior back simply would not be denied Friday night in what was billed — by the Harrison boosters — as "Revenge of the Hawks."

Revenge Is what they got, too, in a blg way. The Hawks romped past Livo-nia Churchill — the team that shat-tered Harrison's season last year — 49-

"Not revenge," said Miller, always the gentleman. "Just a long year of sweating and working for this game. Everyone was pumped up, to say the least."

None more so than Miller. All be did was run the ball 31 times for 281 yards and four touchowns, caught three passes for 44 yards and a touchdown and intercepted a pass.

"We knew how good he was," said
Churchill coach Herb Osterland of Miller. "But, when you see him from the
sidelines it's a whole different story.
Ho's really something."

MILLER WASN'T expected to earry the ball that much. The initial plan, ac-cording to Harrison coach John Herr-ington, was to test the Charger second-ary.

"Last year they played us three deep (in the defensive secondary)," said Herrington. "So, we wanted to throw four receivers out there and go at them that way. But, it didn't work out and we went to the run."

The tempo of the game swung in Harrison's favor very early in the game. Harrison sophomore Scott Bissell picked off a John Stofistadis pass on Churchill's second play. It was one of two interceptions for the talented cophomore and one of five Harrison interceptions on the night.

Harrison marched 34 yards in five plays, all bandoffs to Miller, after Bis-sell's interception. Miller took it in from the 9.

Churchill's second drive of the night netted two yards. Harrison then forced a bad punt — it traveled 3 yards. Four handoffs to Miller and 36 yards later, it was 13-0. Miller scored this one from

Harrison was off and running. Before the half ended, Harrison had built up a 35-7 lead.

Miller scored from the 6 capping a 51-yard drive (he gained every yard in that drive also). Quarterback Vince Enright ran in the 2-point conversion.

On Hawks' next possession they went 89 yards in two plays. One was a 44-yard run by Miller, the other a pretty 45-yard TD pass from Enright to Brian Smollnski.

THE CHARGERS, however, showed a lot of grit. Stoitsladds engineered a 72-yard scoring drive, and capped it off by hitting Tim Davis on a 17-yard scoring strike.

Enright completed 8 of 18 passes for 135 yards on the night. Miller scored on a 1-yard run and re-serve quarterback Matt Dowd threw a 28-yard touchdown pass to Rod Sarcev-ich to close out Harrison's scoring in the second half.

Stoltsladis was the spark plug in Churchill's 13-12 win at Harrison last

year.

He didn't beat Harrison this year, but, with the help of an outstanding group of receivers and a pugnacious of-fensive line, he rolled up more points on a Harrison defense than any team has since the fifth game of the 1980 season when Walled Lake Western scored 28 points in a 31-28 loss.

"I NEVER would have thought we'd give up 21 points against them," Herr-ington said afterward. "We just couldn't stop Stoitsladis. He's just a super athlete. And their offensive line was super. We couldn't get to him."

In the fourth quarter, when most op-ponents would have long since given up the ship, Stoitsiadis directed his team two long scoring drives.

The loss drops Churchill to 1-3 on the season. Harrison is now 3-0.


